## City Manager Budget Overview

#### From City Manager Lehman Walker

On June 8, 2015, City Council approved the annual city budget for fiscal year (FY) 2016 (July 1, 2015 - June 30, 2016).

#### **Budget Highlights**

- No increase in real estate taxes for either residential or commercial property.
- Partnering with the University City School District and local businesses to fund the Youth Employment Program.
- Hiring a part-time senior

coordinator to provide assistance to the seniors in our community and to develop programs for our senior population with the assistance and input of the Commission on Senior Issues.

- Continuing to fund U City in Bloom for the maintenance of gardens and other beautification projects throughout the city.
- Funding for the Chamber of Commerce to assist with economic development.
- Funding for the annual Fair U City.
- Increasing funds to upgrade aging, city-owned buildinas.
- Providing a 2 percent cost of living increase for all full-time city employees.

#### **Budget Influences**

The objectives of this budget are to maintain a high level of services with a moderate increase in revenues, and continue to implement the strategies and policies articulated in the city's long-range plans and initiatives. Several factors impact these objectives, including:

- Realistic projection of revenues and expenditures help to ensure that adequate resources will be available to meet budgeted obligations.
- The decline in assessed value of city properties in 2013 and 2014, with no increase in tax rates, has resulted in a decrease in property tax revenues for FY 2015 and 2016.
- The FY 2016 surplus budget will maintain the same level of fund reserves at approximately 55 percent.
- The cost of living increase for all employees is budgeted at 2 percent, which will help retain high-quality employees.
- The costs of employee benefits continue to increase, specifically for medical insurance, workers compensation and pension contributions.
- Major fees, penalties and interest on delinquent bills remain the same as previous years.

#### **Budget Overview**

This budget includes projected revenues and expenditures. The total revenues in all funds are estimated at \$33,630,000 and the total expenditures are estimated at \$33.175.000. The FY 2016 budget is anticipated to have a surplus of \$455,000 for all funds.

#### **Economic Outlook**

There has been a long period of unprecedented financial instability both regionally and globally. City revenue estimates for sales tax and other economicrelated activity continue to be either flat or less than in previous years, which has a significant impact on the budget.

The city still has significant financial challenges ahead in continuing to provide the current quality of city services and significant improvements to the city's infrastructure, which includes streets, curbs and sidewalks.

## A Look Back at University City

E.G. Lewis, founder of University City, was a successful magazine publisher. On Sept. 18, 1908, he welcomed America's most famous and controversial newspaper publisher, William Randolph Hearst. Today, Hearst is best known as the (unacknowledged) subject of Citizen Kane. It was politics that brought him to University City. After losing a race for mayor of New York, he founded the Independence Party, and in 1908 he was campaigning with its candidate for president. Thomas Higsden.

The St. Louis Post-Dispatch said that Lewis took Hearst and his party on a motor tour of western St. Louis and University City. That evening, Hearst and Higsden spoke at a rally at the Odeon Theatre. Here, they pose on the steps of City Hall, then the headquarters of Lewis's publishing company.

## **Developing a Shared Community Vision for Our City**

**Update on the City's Comprehensive Planning Process** 

Since the last edition of ROARS, the city's planning consultant, Comprehensive Plan Advisory Committee (CPAC) and staff have been working on a draft of the Comprehensive Plan. As a reminder, the Comprehensive Plan Update is a policy document, not an ordinance or law, that helps guide future growth and decisions about land use, infrastructure, parks, community services and economic development.

A draft of the Olive Boulevard Subarea Plan, intended to be one of the sections in the overall plan document, will be reviewed by the CPAC in September. The complete plan draft will follow, for review by the CPAC, as well. After CPAC feedback is incorporated into the draft plan, public meetings and input opportunities will be scheduled.

Data collection and analysis for this project have uncovered several interesting insights about our city. For example, did you know...

- The median age in U City is 38 years old?
   Our population is younger than the St. Louis
   County median age. However, it is aging
   at a slightly quicker pace than the rest of
   the county (4 percent increase versus 3.5
   percent increase between 2010 and 2019).
   By 2019, the city's population is expected
   to be roughly the same size as it is today.
   It is also predicted to be slightly older,
   wealthier and even more diverse.
- Each day, roughly 13,000 residents commute from U City to a variety of destinations for work? Conversely, nearly 6,800 non-residents commute into U City for work from other areas in the region.

## Visit the New and Improved Lewis Park!

In the fall of 2013, the city completed and approved an updated master plan for Lewis Park using planning grants funded by the St. Louis Municipal Parks Grant Commission (MPGC). In early 2014, the city received a construction grant from the MPGC to supplement general revenue funds in order to implement improvements to Lewis Park. We are pleased to say that the following improvements have been made to Lewis Park:





- Dredging the pond and improving water quality
- Installing new rain gardens
- Making improvements to entrances and trails
- Removing existing stairs and installing new stairs from Delmar Boulevard and new park amenities
- Landscaping, including planting trees and creating the colorful, woodland gardens
- Removing dying trees from the hill from Delmar, allowing the hill to be regraded

The newly sloped hill should make for fantastic sledding this winter. Head over to Lewis Park (on the corner of Delmar Boulevard and Yale Avenue) to experience the improvements yourself!
