A. MEETING CALLED TO ORDER

At the Regular Session of the City Council of University City held on the fifth floor of City Hall, on Monday, September 12, 2016, Mayor Shelley Welsch, called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

B. ROLL CALL

In addition to the Mayor, the following members of Council were present:

Councilmember Terry Crow (via Skype)
Councilmember Michael Glickert (via Skype)
Councilmember Bwayne Smotherson

Mayor Welsch announced that as a result of the participation via Skype, all votes will be conducted by Roll Call. In the event a member loses their video connection during a discussion they will not be allowed to take part in the vote.

Mayor Welsch announced that due to technical difficulties Councilmember Glickert, who is participating in the meeting via telephone, will not be allowed to participate in any votes that relate to Ordinances.

C. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Councilmember Jennings stated that Mr. John Owens' application was received last Friday and therefore would request that the agenda be amended to include Owens' nomination to the Board of Adjustment.

Councilmember Carr requested that the two items related to 7901 Glenside Place be moved to the beginning of the agenda to avoid any further delays and was seconded by Councilmember Smotherson.

Mayor Welsch noted that Councilmember Glickert and Councilmember Crow's connections were lost and that the vote will proceed with the majority of Council present in the Chambers.

Voice vote to approve the agenda as amended carried unanimously.

E. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

1. August 8, 2016 Regular session minutes were moved for approval by Councilmember Smotherson and were seconded by Councilmember Jennings.

Councilmember Carr requested that the spelling of Ms. Nielson, found on pages 8 and 9, be amended to reflect the correct spelling N-e-i-l-s-e-n, of name of email she referenced.

Voice vote to approve the minutes as amended carried unanimously.

G. SWEARING IN to BOARDS & COMMISSIONS

H. CITIZEN PARTICIPATION (Total of 15 minutes allowed) Steve McMahon, 8135 Stanford Avenue, University City, MO

Mr. McMahon stated that after a review of the City's records on EMS response times, he found some discrepancies. He was pleased to see that this administration had issued an RFQ to obtain an analysis of the EMS Response Times for Gateway Ambulance. He stated that it has always been his position that although saving money is vital, the City must have a plan that will maintain the quality of its EMS service. If an in depth analysis demonstrates the promised improved response times, which would be great news. Mr. McMahon suggested that the City meet with Gateway to review communications, personnel, interagency relations, management, financial management, equipment, facilities, working conditions, public relations and a clinical standard; to ensure that residents are receiving quality services that are essential.

Councilmember Crow temporarily rejoined the meeting by video conferencing and questioned what procedure would be followed if his video connection was lost again? Mayor Welsch stated that they would try to contact him via his cell phone, although the City is still having problems with its phone connection. (Councilmember Crow's audio was lost shortly after this.)

Kristine Hendrix, 1205 Meyer Street, University City, MO

Ms. Hendrix stated that she had forwarded a copy of a video related to an incident that occurred yesterday during a benefit concert in the Loop to Councilmember Jennings. She then expressed concerns about the Police Department's continued violation of individual human rights and the need to hold them accountable for their actions.

Ms. Hendrix also expressed concerns about Council's failure to provide funding for Create Space, a vital organization within this community that promotes youth in business and entrepreneurship.

Thomas Jennings, 7055 Forsyth, University City, MO

Mr. Jennings questioned whether the City has been brought into the proposed Centene expansion, and if so, when University City residents would be informed about the impact this project may have on their neighborhood?

Councilmember Smotherson stated that since parking is an issue of importance in this area, he would like to know whether there will be any designated parking for the 16 employees who may be on the site at any given time.

Mark Groenda of Blackline Design and Construction stated that the parking stalls along the alley have been designated for staff.

Councilmember Carr asked Councilmember Smotherson whether his concern regarding egress into the alleyway had been addressed. Councilmember Smotherson stated that they had been, and the egress will now be off of Olive. Councilmember Carr asked Mr. Walker if it was correct to assume that no one from Urban Sprouts would be entering the alley. Mr. Walker stated that it would be correct.

4. Approval to grant the City Manager authority to execute the Flood Mitigation Agency, FMA grant agreement with the Federal Emergency Management Agency to complete the buyout of one home on Glenside Place.

Ms. Patton thanked staff for their work on this project and stated that she would appreciate anything they could do to expedite the buyout.

Councilmember Carr stated that she would like to go on record stating that she hates to pay for parking, and believed that this increase will prove to be an impediment for businesses located in the Loop. She then asked what efforts would be made to ensure that the meters remain in working order and the City is collecting the respective fees. Mr. Walker stated that currently staff monitors the meters on a regular basis to ensure that they are in proper working order.

Luke Babich, 750 Washington Avenue, University City, MO

Mr. Babich stated that he is running for City Council in the 1st Ward and wanted to take this opportunity to introduce himself. Mr. Babich provided a brief history of his educational and job experience with University City that has provided him with numerous opportunities to see how government works, as well as how he can make it work better for this community. He stated that he looks forward to meeting and talking with all of his fellow citizens about the issues, and would encourage everyone to join him in these conversations by phone, or at lukebabich.com.

Andrew Roberts, 940 Alanson Drive, University City, MO

Mr. Roberts encouraged everyone to vote for Steve McMahon for City Council.

Jan Adams, 7150 Cambridge Avenue, University City, MO

Ms. Adams expressed concerns about the notice she received from Councilmember Smotherson, regarding a public meeting he conducted at the Heman Park Community Center on August 30th, to discuss the senior housing development being proposed for Ward 3. She questioned if Mr. Smotherson provided the proper meeting notice regarding a City housing development meeting and if he conducted the meeting with fair and proper rules, knowing that he silenced certain speakers. Ms. Adams suggested that Council establish rules for these types of meetings or require that individual Councilmembers who conduct meetings to advocate their political agenda, be required to pay rent, post the event as a private meeting and announce that Council rules will not be adhered to during the meeting. (Ms. Adams asked that her written comments be made a part of the record.)

Bart Stewart, 714 Harvard Avenue, University City, MO

Mr. Stewart stated that his understanding is that the meeting referenced by Ms. Adams was a town hall meeting, and was not on the City's dime. He stated a large part of this City have not been informed of things that have been going on for the past two years and others have attended public meetings, been removed from meetings and have not had their voices heard.

 Mayor Welsch noted that Council had received some minutes in this week's packet.
- 4. Other Discussions/Business
 - RFQ for EMS Response Time Analysis requested by Councilmembers Carr and Smotherson.

Councilmember Carr stated that since September of 2015, she has been requesting City dispatch records as a basis of comparison with the self-reported time records produced by Gateway Ambulance. The City Manager and City Clerk have put up an incredible roadblock for access to those public records for citizens, as well as herself, who have requested information via Sunshine requests. However according to a legal opinion issued in the case of Ms. Lynn Ricci, as an elected officer of the City, she is entitled to everything. While the access of these public records was blocked for some, they were made readily available to Greg Pace, when the City wanted to use these records as a rationale for outsourcing. That the City Manager did not find it important to monitor a contractor is astounding.

On June 27, 2015, during the budget meeting, Councilmember Carr stated she proposed that funds be set aside to hire an independent consultant to evaluate Gateway's performance. That proposal was voted down, and was not included in the City Manager's subsequent budget amendments. However, on August 30th, she noticed that the City Manager had issued an RFQ for an EMS response time analysis. So while she is pleased that the City is finally getting this analysis, she would like to pose the following questions:

- 1. What question/questions is the City hoping to answer through this analysis? Mr. Walker stated that his belief is that the RFQ speaks for itself in terms of the basic questions that staff would like answered, which is an analysis of the response times in order to verify the information Gateway has been providing to the City on a monthly basis.
- 2. Will the City's dispatch records now be provided to citizens and members of Council? Mr. Walker advised Councilmember Carr that his belief is that she has been provided with all of the information requested that is not HIPPA-protected.
- 3. What is missing from the data that now necessitates the need to spend taxpayer's money to hire an outside consultant? Mr. Walker stated that the City has reached its first anniversary with respect to the outsourcing of these services and he believes that it is important to have an objective, outside review, completed by a third-party.

Councilmember Carr stated that she thoroughly agrees that the City needs to take a look at this data, and would like to read and enter into the record, the latest communication to the City Clerk, from the Attorney General's Office, dated September 2, 2016. *The letter from the Attorney General has been attached to the end of these minutes.*

Councilmember Carr stated that she has to ask herself whether the City is making every effort to comply with the Sunshine Law in spirit and in fact, or whether they are creating barriers to the access of public documents, especially with respect to this critical public safety issue.

P. COUNCIL COMMENTS

Mayor Welsch made the following announcements:

- Wednesday, September 14th The Traffic Commission will be briefed on the Centene proposal and its possible effects on traffic. (The Plan Commission will also be briefed at their meeting next week.)
- The Department of Community Development has shared a memo with Council regarding the City's background and involvement with the Centene proposal, which she would be glad to share with anyone who would like to see it.

- Friday, September 16th The U City Chamber of Commerce will hold its Golf Tournament
- Sunday, September 18th U City Bloom will sponsor its Dining with the Artists fundraiser.

Councilmember Jennings thanked everyone who participated in last month's panel discussion on gun violence, which resulted in his desire to establish the "Tyrone and Tyrell Thompson 911 Health and Safety Bill". The bill is named after the sons of a resident of this community who lost their lives as a result of gun violence. The intent is to impose a \$10,000 fine and one-year imprisonment for anyone arrested for illegal possession or discharge of a weapon within the boundaries of U City. Councilmember Jennings stated that although he was surprised to learn that municipalities did not have the authority to legislate gun laws, he is committed to working with elected officials to create a petition that someday may be adopted into legislation.

Councilmember Jennings stated that there has been no substantial development in the 3rd Ward for 50 years, so although some of these are only in the preliminary stage, he is excited and proud to announce four new business proposals.

- The Dog Friendly Cafe, proposed for Midland and Olive. This project is the brainchild of a current Loop business owner who would like to develop a restaurant with an outside play area for dogs;
- 2. Renovation of the Nathaniel Hawthorne School into the Nathaniel Hawthorne Senior Living Community;
- 3. Urban Sprouts, which has a small facility on Midland and Vernon, is converting the McCarthy Spice building into a major child development center, and
- 4. Senn Bierwerks will soon be opening on Olive and North and South.

He stated that all of these proposals represent game-changing events that provide an opportunity to develop Skinker, up to 1-70 as the City's new downtown. Councilmember Jennings asked for everyone's support in these efforts, and encouraged residents to address any concerns or questions with members of Council.

Councilmember Jennings stated that he had a blast at the Puppy Pool Party, a major fundraiser for the organization responsible for the U City Dog Park. He encouraged residents to support this organization by attending next year's event.

Councilmember Jennings asked residents to not only attend U City High School's Homecoming on October 1st, but give consideration to supporting the PTO, which is in need of uniforms, supplies for the Senior Dance and items to help build floats. Let's show these kids that this community does care through our participation and support of their efforts.

Mayor Welsch adjourned the meeting at 7:46 p.m.

COUNCIL COMMENTS – SEPTEMBER 12, 2016

I rise to clarify the protocol for public meetings on City business, held in City buildings that are owned and maintained by the taxpayers, but called by, and controlled by, one Council Member. I am referring to the meeting controlled by Councilmember Smotherson on August 30 at the Heman Park Community Center.

My first question: What is proper notice? The notice I received was on social media. A number of people complained that they would have attended if they had known. I contend that if you are an elected official, conducting a meeting regarding a City housing development, you should be <u>required</u> to provide the same notice required for all other City business.

My second question: What are fair and proper rules? I believe the vast majority of citizens agree that as a fundamental principal rules should be 1) reasonable, 2) objective, 3) published and 4) uniformly applied.

The rules for this meeting were not clearly stated. The hand out included a Q&A session, but it did NOT say that the session would be in private nor held AFTER the close of the meeting. Therefore, when I raised my hand, was recognized by the Councilman and allowed to ask a question, I was <u>quite surprised</u> that the Councilman then would not allow Mr. Babich the same opportunity. Others were also allowed to engage in Q&A during the presentation. And, I was not the only person <u>to verbally object</u> to the denial of Mr. Babich.

My immediate conclusion was that he was being silenced because he was a political candidate and the other candidate <u>failed to attend</u> the meeting. Yes, I advocated for Mr. Babich's right to speak by calling out one simple phrase, "right to free speech". Another person called out "no right to speak when not a resident of Ward 3". I was admonished, she was not. So the rules at this meeting were NOT published, NOT objective and certainly NOT uniformly applied.

In fact, Mr. Smotherson admits this in a social media post and admits that <u>he violated his own rules</u>, I quote:

"I also specifically informed him he could not speak <u>concerning his campaign</u>. ... the end of Tim Person's presentation...Candidate Babich stated that he had something to say and wanted to <u>address some of the things</u> <u>being presented</u>.... I requested Candidate Babich immediately take his seat, explaining that his actions and request were unprofessional. He stated <u>he wanted to tell us what he had been studying and what he knew about the discussion</u>. I again asked him to take his seat, and he could not address the group... He then asked if he could then ask a question. I reiterated that he could not..." MR. SMOTHERSON'S WORDS NOT MINE.

Mr. Smotherson allowed Joe Adams to speak and he is on record as endorsing Steve McMahon – so political speech WAS on the agenda.

Mr. Smotherson also posted a challenge to me, I quote:

"... I want to specifically address Jan Adams' view [which was]...completely inaccurate, misplaced, and unprofessional...filled with misinformation in hopes of making people believe I did something against our protocol and therefore against Candidate Babich. ...I answered her questions as she noted because <u>everyone has a right to questions</u>." But he just admitted above that he would not allow Mr. Babich to ask questions.

His post also states, "Out of professional consideration for <u>our proceedings</u>, I refused to allow him to speak." So, my question is who is the "our" in "our proceedings"? I receive a notice of a public meeting about housing development for seniors. I am a senior, interested in housing development so I attend. But, that was not an open and fair public meeting.

Where is it written that one council member has the power to make the rules <u>as he goes</u> <u>along</u> and apply them based on his political affiliation to one candidate over the other? If you want to conduct political theater, say that, so I don't waste my time. Also, don't use my tax money when you do.

My request is that this Council either establish rules for these types of meetings, or require individual Council Members to pay rent, post it as a private meeting and announce that Council Rules will not be applied.

Re: Sunshine Law Complaint

Dear Ms. Pumm,

The Missouri Attorney General's Office has received another complaint from a constituent regarding the fees the City of University City is charging to fulfill open records requests.

Mr. Jeff Hales contacted our office on August 19, 2016 and stated that he requested the Gateway Ambulance Response Report for the Months of April, May and June of 2016. These response reports appear to have all of the ambulance response times reported by the private contractor. The city informed Mr. Hales on August 11, 2016, that it would cost \$49.52 for the Fire Chief to research the request for one hour, and that there would be a \$5.60 charge for the 56 pages of information.

Mr. Hales is concerned that the Fire Chief has been assigned the task of looking up three emails, and they are likely the highest paid staff member in the office. The body's response did not indicate that the office would have to spend time redacting the information. Our office would like to know why Mr. Hales is being charged for the Fire Chief's time to fulfill the request. It is likely that the Fire Chief is paid a higher salary than other department employees and the Sunshine Law requires in § 610.026.1(1), RSMo, "Based on the scope of the request, the public governmental body shall produce the copies using employees of the body that result in the lowest amount of charges for search, research, and duplication time."

Currently our office also has been working the city regarding an open records request made by Ms. Aren Ginsberg. Ms. Ginsberg asked to receive copies of the city's ambulance response times recorded in University City's Computer Aided

Dispatch System. Ms. Ginsberg is being charged over \$700 for these records because the city indicated the records would need to be redacted.

The Missouri Sunshine Law specifically states in § 610.023.4, RSMo, "If a request for access is denied, the custodian shall provide, upon request, a written statement of the grounds for such denial. Such statement shall cite the specific provision of law under which access is denied and shall be furnished to the requester no later than the end of the third business day following the date that the request for the statement is received." While our office has received a statement from the city indicating why they believe the information is closed, we have not yet received a specific citation regarding this issue. Please provide our office with the specific citation allowing the city to close this information.

We are aware that Mr. Hales' information would have been provided by Gateway Ambulance Services and Ms. Ginsberg's information would have been created by the public governmental body. Apart from the information origins though, these two requests seem to be very similar. Please provide our office with an explanation stating why there is such a large discrepancy between the costs associated with these two requests.

Our office was also informed that Mr. Steve McMahon received an ambulance response time records on October 29, 2015. It may be helpful to our office to know how much Mr. McMahon was charged for those records. Please provide our office with a copy of the invoice submitted to Mr. McMahon indicating how much the body intended to charge for his request.

We hope to receive your responses as soon as possible, and no later than September 16, 2016.

Code

Article 6 of the University City Zoning Code sets forth regulations and standards for Historic Landmarks and Districts within University City. One of the Historic Districts established in Article 6 of the Zoning Code is the Civic Complex Historic District, which includes several buildings and structures near the intersection of Delmar Boulevard and Trinity Avenue, and often referred to as the Civic Plaza (see map in Attachment "A"). This district does not currently include the Old University City Library building at 630 Trinity Avenue.

With the recent approval of Proposition H by University City voters, related to the preservation of certain City-owned historic buildings and structures including the Old University City Library, the Historic Preservation Commission (HPC) recently requested that staff prepare and initiate a Zoning Text Amendment to expand the Civic Complex Historic District boundaries to include the building. The proposed boundary expansion is shown on the map in Attachment "A". For background information on the Old University City Library building, please see Attachment "B".

Zoning Code Text Amendments that impact Historic Districts require a recommendation from the HPC as part of the review process. At their June 16, 2016 meeting, the HPC recommended approval of such Zoning Text Amendment (see Attachment "C") which consists of the addition of the name of the building, a revision to the description of the district boundary to include the building, and includes an additional paragraph for reference to a book for historical significance ("The University City Civic Plaza: A Brief History of Its Planning and Architecture" published by the Historical Society of University City in 1995). The Zoning Text Amendment as recommended by HPC is included in Attachment "D".

At their meeting on July 12, 2016, the Code Review Committee (CRC) recommended approval of the Text Amendment. The Plan commission is requested to consider the proposal and make a recommendation to the City Council. A formal public hearing would be held at the City Council level.




m. Center of Contemporary Arts (COCA), 524 Trinity Avenue (1945-1950, Eric Mendelsohn, architect)



The former B'nai Amoona Synagogue, was built by a Conservative congregation organized in St. Louis in the 1880s. It is a bold modern building both in planning and form, the first American work of architect Eric Mendelsohn, who fled the Nazis and came to this country in 1941. The entry courtyard and flexible plan, with movable walls in the interior, and the sweeping, cantilevered roof are strong design features. After B'nai Amoona moved from University City in 1985, the building was converted to a facility for the arts, the Center of Contemporary Arts, or COCA.

n. University City Public Library, 6701 Delmar Boulevard (1969, Smith & Entzeroth, archts)

The campus of E. G. Lewis's People's University was planned to extend from the Art Academy (see Lewis Center) to the corner of Delmar and Kingsland. The construction of Delmar-Harvard School in 1913 and 1920, and of the University City Public Library, completed in 1969, fulfilled the Lewis plan to dedicate this corner to educational purposes. Alhough the building has only two stories, its elements are large in scale and its character and use fulfill Lewis's intentions for the plaza.



2. Bais Abraham Synagogue

6910 Delmar Boulevard (1927, Lee & Rush, architects)

Outside the designated historic district but related to it in its institutional use, this buff colored brick Gothic Revival building was constructed for the University Church of Christ. In 1936, it was purchased by Tpheris Israel Congregation, which had been worshipping in the Loop above Talisnick's Market at Delmar and Kingsland, but had been organized in St. Louis in 1899. At this site, the congregation merged with Chevra Kadisha in 1960 and moved from University City thirteen years later. The building was sold to Bais Abraham, an Orthodox congregation founded in 1894.

3. Old University City Library


630 Trinity (1938-39, Klipstein & Rathmann, architects)

A 1938 Public Works Administration grant and a municipal bond issue funded University City's first public library building. The Georgian Revival style building, twice remodeled and enlarged, served the city until 1969 when the new library was built. It is now used by the University City Residential Service, Ochs Senior Center and other community offices. The building is outside the Civic Plaza Historic District but is related to it architecturally and historically.

630 Trinity

Old University City Public Library, 1938-39 Klipstein & Rathmann, architects



The original University City Library was a New Deal project and an example of the city's commitment to learning The Public Works Administration (PWA) provided a grant of \$32,580 in 1938, intended to cover 45% of the projected cost of a new building; the local match was provided by a voter-approved municipal bond issue of \$39,000. The building at 630 Trinity was completed in 1939 to designs of Klipstein & Rathmann.

Ernest Klipstein (1866-1931) had formed a partnership with Walter Lincoln Rathmann (1880-1954) in 1908. They were best known for their work for Anheuser-Busch, including the Bevo Mill on Gravois and the Bauernhof at Grant's Farm. Their Civil Courts Building at Market & Tucker became the focus of St. Louis's own Civic Plaza. After Klipstein's death and the onset of the Depression, Rathmann focused on public work, including the new St. Louis Post Office at 18th and Market. His design here, with its dominant front door under a central pediment, is reminiscent of his own house at 6400 Cecil in Clayton.

The old library building was twice remodeled and enlarged over the years. When the new public library opened at 6701 Delmar in 1970, this one was used for municipal offices and community services. The University City Residential Service, a non-profit organization incorporated in 1967, has been at this location since 1973. It provides free information to the public on all available housing in the city and has been credited with playing a valuable role in the successful integration of the city.

WHEREAS, the City Plan Commission in a meeting held at the Heman Park Community Center located at 975 Pennsylvania Avenue, University City, Missouri on July 27, 2016 at 6:30 pm recommended amendment of Section 400.1740, of said Code; and

WHEREAS, due notice of a public hearing to be held by the City Council in the 5th Floor City Council Chambers at City Hall at 6:30 pm, September 12, 2016, was duly published in the St. Louis Countian, a newspaper of general circulation within said City on August 28, 2016; and

WHEREAS, said public hearing was held at the time and place specified in said notice, and all suggestions or objections concerning said amendments of the Zoning Code were duly heard and considered by the City Council.

These finalized rates are due to St. Louis County by October 1st.

RESOLUTION NO. 2016 - 23

<u>Section 1</u>. There is hereby levied for the year 2016 upon all real and personal property, subject to taxation, in the City of University City, Missouri, the following taxes for the following purposes, to wit:

- A. For general revenue purposes a tax of \$0.569 on residential property, a tax of \$0.546 on commercial property and a tax of \$0.680 on personal property, on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) of assessed valuation.
- B. For Police and Firefighter Retirement purposes a tax of \$0.165 on residential property, a tax of \$0.148 on commercial property and a tax of \$0.195 on personal property, on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) of assessed valuation.

<u>Section 2</u>. There is hereby levied for the year 2016 upon all real property, subject to taxation, in the University City Loop Special Business District, an additional tax of said district of \$0.586 for residential property and \$0.498 for commercial property, on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) of assessed valuation.

<u>Section 3</u>. Existing Conditions:

Currently the Traffic Code includes the below section:

Section 355.040 Disabled Parking.

- A. It is unlawful for the operator of a vehicle to stop, stand or park any vehicle in a parking space designed for disabled persons if, immediately adjacent to and visible from such parking space, there is posted a sign known as the international symbol of accessibility consisting of a profile view of a stylized wheelchair with occupant in white on a blue background.
- <u>B.</u> Designated disabled parking spaces may only be used when a disabled person is then, or immediately preceding being parked, was an occupant of the motor vehicle bearing the disabled license plate or windshield hanging placard issued to the disabled person pursuant to the provisions of Section 301.142, RSMo., or by those states with which the Missouri Director of Revenue has entered into reciprocity agreements.
- <u>C.</u> The provisions of Subsections (A) and (B) of this Section shall apply to all off-street parking facilities owned or operated by the City or by any privately owned or operated parking lot as well as any on-street disabled parking spaces.
- <u>D.</u> The driver, or any occupant, of a motor vehicle bearing disabled license plates or a windshield hanging placard which is parked or has been observed to have been parking in a duly designated disabled parking space shall, upon request from any law enforcement officer, produce the disabled registration certificate issued to the disabled person or entity as provided for in Section 301.142, RSMo., or such other authorization to show that the driver or any occupant of the vehicle is lawfully entitled to use a designated disabled parking space.
- E. All disabled persons residing in the City, may request on-street disabled parking on a residential street. On-street disabled parking spaces shall be established upon written application by an owner whose motor vehicle bears disabled license plates or a windshield hanging placard issued pursuant to Section 301.142, RSMo. Such application shall be subject to City review and will not be issued if any existing traffic regulations indicate to the contrary or if the property of the disabled person has a driveway or other off-street parking space accessible to the disabled person, unless there are unique circumstances found by the Director of Public Works and Parks.
- F. The Director of Public Works and Parks shall issue and keep a log of all on-street disabled parking.
- <u>G.</u> Any person who parks in a space reserved for physically disabled persons and is not displaying distinguishing license plates or a card is guilty of an infraction and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than fifty dollars (\$50.00) nor more than three hundred dollars (\$300.00). Any vehicle which has been removed and which is not properly claimed within thirty (30) days thereafter shall be considered to be an abandoned vehicle.

Request:

Revise the Traffic Code Chapter 355.040, to add provisions to assign permit numbers to a resident's approved disable parking signs with matching car stickers.

Conclusion/Recommendation:

City Staff recommends approval of the proposed changes as shown in the attached draft revision.

Section 355.040. Disabled Parking.

Any vehicle which has been removed and which is not properly claimed within thirty (30) days thereafter shall be considered to be an abandoned vehicle.

F. All disabled persons residing in the City, may request on-street disabled parking on a residential street. On-street disabled parking spaces shall be established upon written application by an owner whose motor vehicle bears disabled license plates or a windshield hanging placard issued pursuant to Section 301.142, RSMo. Such application shall be subject to City review and will not be issued if any existing traffic regulations indicate to the contrary or if the property of the disabled person has a driveway or other off-street parking space accessible to the disabled person, unless there are unique circumstances found by the Director of Public Works and Parks.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF UNIVERSITY CITY, MISSOURI, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 355.040, Disable Parking of Chapter 355 of the Traffic Code, of the University City Municipal Code is amended as provided herein. Language to be deleted from the Code is represented as stricken through; language to be added to the Code is emphasized. This Ordinance contemplates no revisions to the Code other than those so designated; any language or provisions from the Code omitted from this Ordinance is represented by an ellipsis and remains in full force and effect.

Section 2. Chapter 355 of the University City Municipal Code is hereby amended to change the Disable Parking system to designate a parking space to a specific disable person, amending the fine amounts and prohibiting long-term parking on disable parking spaces, to the Traffic Code – Section 355.040, as follows:

Chapter 355. Stopping, Standing or Parking Prohibited in Specified Places

Section 355.040. Disabled Parking.

A. It is unlawful for the operator of a vehicle to stop, stand or park any vehicle in a parking space designed for disabled persons if, immediately adjacent to and visible from such parking space, there is posted a sign known as the international symbol of accessibility consisting of a profile view of a stylized wheelchair with occupant in white on a blue background.

- B. Designated disabled parking spaces may only be used when a disabled person is then, or immediately preceding being parked, was an occupant of the motor vehicle bearing the disabled license plate or windshield hanging placard issued to the disabled person pursuant to the provisions of Section 301.142, RSMo., or by those states with which the Missouri Director of Revenue has entered into reciprocity agreements.
- C. The provisions of Subsections (A) and (B) of this Section shall apply to all off-street parking facilities owned or operated by the City or by any privately owned or operated parking lot as well as any on-street disabled parking spaces.

- D. The driver, or any occupant, of a motor vehicle bearing disabled license plates or a windshield hanging placard which is parked or has been observed to have been parking in a duly designated disabled parking space shall, upon request from any law enforcement officer, produce the disabled registration certificate issued to the disabled person or entity as provided for in Section 301.142, RSMo., or such other authorization to show that the driver or any occupant of the vehicle is lawfully entitled to use a designated disabled parking space.
- E. Any person who parks in a space reserved for physically disabled persons and is not displaying distinguishing license plates or a card is guilty of an infraction and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than fifty dollars (\$50.00) nor more than two hundred twenty-five dollars (\$225.00). Any vehicle which has been removed and which is not properly claimed within thirty (30) days thereafter shall be considered to be an abandoned vehicle.
- F. All disabled persons residing in the City, may request on-street disabled parking on a residential street. On-street disabled parking spaces shall be established upon written application by an owner whose motor vehicle bears disabled license plates or a windshield hanging placard issued pursuant to Section 301.142, RSMo. Such application shall be subject to City review and will not be issued if any existing traffic regulations indicate to the contrary or if the property of the disabled person has a driveway or other off-street parking space accessible to the disabled person, unless there are unique circumstances found by the Director of Public Works and Parks.
- G. If the application is approved, a numbered permit shall be issued to the applicant and shall be posted on the windshield of said vehicle. The permit must be used at all times with the permit holder's permanent disabled placard or license plate. The City shall install signs indicating such restricted parking space on any public right-of-way for a period of time not to exceed two (2) years subject to bi-annual renewal. The permit must have the corresponding permit number that is displayed on the signs.
- H. The applicant must observe and obey any other parking restrictions which may apply at the approved location (i.e. Street Cleaning signs).
- I. The privilege of a disabled parking space will be immediately discontinued with misuse of any kind.
- J. The permitted parking space shall not be used for long-term storage of vehicles. The vehicle must be kept in good repair and shall be operational. For the purposes of this Section, long-term storage of vehicles is defined as any vehicle parked or left standing on a public street in the same location and not driven or moved in excess of fourteen consecutive calendar days. If an applicant is unable to move his or her vehicle within the fourteen day period, the applicant shall request an extension of the fourteen day period from the City Director of Public Works and Parks. The Director shall only grant an extension upon the applicant's showing of good cause. An extension shall be limited to thirty days from the day it was granted. Each applicant shall be limited to three extensions per year.

K. The permitted parking space is for use solely by the applicant and their personal vehicle; it is not intended as parking or a loading zone for friends, relatives or visitors. If another vehicle uses this space, the illegally parked vehicle may receive a ticket of not less than fifty dollars (\$50.00) nor more than two hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$225.00).

L. The Director of Public Works and Parks shall issue and keep a log of all on-street disabled parking.

G. Any person who parks in a space reserved for physically disabled persons and is not displaying distinguishing license plates or a card is guilty of an infraction and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than fifty dollars (\$50.00) nor more than three hundred dollars (\$300.00). Any vehicle which has been removed and which is not properly claimed within thirty (30) days thereafter shall be considered to be an abandoned vehicle.

* * *

Section 3. This ordinance shall not be construed so as to relieve any person, firm or corporation from any penalty heretofore incurred by the violation of the sections revised by this amendment nor bar the prosecution for any such violation.

Section 4. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of the University City Municipal Code.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage as provided by law.

URBAN FORESTRY COMMISSION MEETING July 13, 2016

Members present: Mark Wallace, James Crowe, Beth Skelton, Mary Harvey, Tom Sontag, and Paulette Carr. There were 5 citizens from the Parkview neighborhood attending to show their opposition to the Washington University plan.

Meeting called to order at 7:02 pm by President Beth Skelton.

<u>Washington University presentation</u>: Cheryl Adelstein Assistant Vice- Chancellor for Community Relations at Washington University, and Klaus Rausch senior associate with SWT Design presented the landscape proposal for the Forest Park Parkway pedestrian bridge and ramp. The University is seeking an easement from the city council to replace the existing bridge and ramp. The construction of the new facilities will require the removal of 15 existing Sweet Gum trees. The University proposes replacing these trees with a total of 42 native species. The planting of the new trees will also require the installation of irrigation and soil amendments. The plan also calls for a swale and native perennial plantings to mitigate water runoff.

Questions: There were numerous questions concerning the width of the ramp surface, Washington University stated the ramp would be approximately an additional 5 feet wider to the east and west of the present surface. Other questions about saving the trees on the west, and the tree marked number 4 on the east were answered by Mr. Rausch who informed the council the ramp itself would be within 12 inches or less of those trees putting them too close to the ramp. The last question concerned the irrigation system, and Mr. Rausch described it as a mixture of drip and spray irrigation with each tree having its own water emitter. The system would be governed by a controller either on site, or in the maintenance facility, monitored by either a human or computer.

<u>Citizen Comments:</u> Mr. David Howard articulated his concern over losing mature, and in his estimation healthy trees. He referred to the actions of the City in 2012, where after a hearing before the Urban Forestry Commission, the City removed its support to widen the entire path from Kingsbury to Forest Park Parkway. Mr. Howard went on to say that Washington University's record of survival of planting on its campus is less than stellar, with over 50% of new plantings dying within the first year in his approximation. Mr. Howard also expressed apprehension due to the increased possibility of flooding from the removal of the mature trees.

Judith Zwicker stepped to the podium to state her support for the points made by Mr. Howard. She further stated that the shade provided by the mature trees was something that could not be replaced quickly and the loss would be a detriment to the neighborhood.

E. F. Porter described his opposition to the project as "a solution in search of a problem". He does not see the need for the replacement of the existing path or removal of the trees. He has not noticed any congestion or accidents in the area, despite the fact that he walks the path numerous times during the day.

M. P. McCauley came to the meeting to show his support for Mr. Howard's position.

<u>Discussion:</u> Mary described her walk on the path that morning, and how the existing trees provided an ambiance and a 'positive vibe' that cannot be replaced. Mary also stated that she had resided in the Parkview neighborhood previously and she understood the unique nature of the area. She understands that many of the residents purchase their homes because of the mature trees and now Washington University was changing that dynamic. Beth is in favor of the plan, and as a cyclist can see the need for the widened ramp. She also stated her concerns over the removal of trees 1 and 4 on the plan and wants Washington University to preserve as many of the existing trees as possible. She also stated the choice of Sweet Gums along a walkway was a poor one and welcomes the diversity, both plant and animal, the new plan will bring.

<u>Vote:</u> Beth then asked for a motion for a vote to recommend that the City Council approve the Washington University proposal to widen the Forest Park Parkway and Ramp calling for the removal of 15 trees and planting 42 new trees. 



Ms. Margie Diekemper called the meeting to order at 6:05PM Roll call was done by Ms. LaRette Reese

New council liaison Paulette Carr was formally introduced and she briefly provided background information about herself and then all members introduced themselves. Members stated they are looking forward to meeting Ms. Carr.

Approval of Minutes:

Ms. Slater moved to approve the meeting minutes from the July 18, 2016 meeting; it was seconded by Mr. Flesch. The motion passed.

Ms. Carr reminded members of the open Ward 1 Council seat, replacing Steve Kraft, which will be on the November ballot. Ms. Carr also provided the following updates:

- A consultant has been hired to review the report and findings of the facility analysis of the annex/police department. The consultant's report will been finished in 30 days.
- The proposed budget resolution did not pass; therefore the budget presented prior to May 1st has been adopted. Some budget amendments have also been approved.

Ms. Mermelstein provided an update on the activities, meetings and programs that she's been working on. She is asking the members to spread the word and encourage people to attend the upcoming workshop series and the Senior's Count educational forums. "Make A Difference Day" is October 22nd; applications are due Sept 15 to the Jodie Lloyd in the Community Development department. Our Lady of Lourdes and Christ the King will be supporting this volunteer effort but more volunteers are needed.

Brief updates were also given on the Timebank volunteer program, Tablewisdom and the intergenerational gardening program at Barbara Jordon School. These options are still on the table as possible ways of getting assistance to the senior population. STL Village confirmed that they are not able to provide volunteer support. The 2 pilot Elderlink sessions held at the library were well received. The hope is to continue these sessions on a regular basis. The first program committee meeting is scheduled for August 24th at Centennial Commons.

Three unfinished business items were discussed

1. Revision to the Commissions by-laws to adjust the quorum requirements when the Commission has a vacant seat(s) was reviewed by all the members (see below).

"When there are Commission vacancies, a majority of filled positions (voting members) will constitute a quorum (e.g. 2 vacancies (5 voting members), quorum would be three (3).) If the number of vacancies results in an even number of filled voting positions, then 50% of those members in attendance constitutes a quorum(e.g. 1 vacancy (6 voting members), quorum would be three (3).)"

Mr. Thomas made a motion to accept the revisions as read, Ms. Merritt seconded, and the motion was passed.

- 2. Members agreed at the last meeting to hold 3 educational forums regarding Senior's Count. The dates are confirmed for August 15 (HPCC), September 15 (UCPL) and October 18 (HPCC). Ms. Carr requested more information; there was open discussion around the senior services fund item that will appear on the November ballot.
- 3. The article submission for the September/October ROARS was submitted and approved.

Other business:

Ms. Diekemper suggested that we think about what the Commission should do go forward and it relates the mission. The original goals are coming to fruition, so maybe the mission should be updated. Members will think about it and come to the September meeting with ideas and feedback.

The iTN transportation pilot committee is moving along and making progress; the service area had been identified. Some benefits of the service are rides are not restricted to medical appointments; service can used for personal trips for shopping, entertainment or anywhere a person wants to go. The reservation timeline is shorter and the goal is for the average ride to cost \$10.00 or less. The pilot would include St. Charles, Chesterfield, Richmond Heights, U City and NORC; it would be 1 larger group. The target date to be up and running is April 2017.

There could be an issue with Taxi Commission; the committee is working to clarify this area of concern. The next steps will include fund raising and education.

New Commission member Wayne Flesch was formally introduced and he briefly provided background information about himself and then all members introduced themselves. Members are looking forward to meeting Ms. Dorothy Merritt, the other new Commission member, at the August meeting.

Approval of Minutes:

Mr. Thomas moved to approve the meeting minutes from the June 20, 2016 meeting; it was seconded by Ms. Hart. The motion passed.

Ms. Mermelstein provided an update on the activities, meetings and programs that she's been working on. The seniors' mailing list is up to 80 and there about 55 names on the email list. The religious leaders' database is up to 21. The first meeting of the new program committee will take place in August; there are 15 residents on the committee at this time. The initial Elderlink help desk sessions at the library have been pretty good; serving between 5-10 people each time. The hope is to make this a regular re-occurring event through Senior Services. A couple of programs being reviewed are the Time Bank volunteer program for home repairs and Table Wisdom, a program the connects older english speaking adults with people who are interesting in improving their english speaking skills.

2. Approval of Minutes

2.a. February 24, 2016 Plan Commission meeting

A motion was made by Mr. Salamon to approve the February 24, 2016 meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Ms. Moran. Mr. Miller stated that under item 6.a., line 2, the word "regulations" needed to be added prior to "pertaining to adult businesses..." The motion to approve the minutes carried unanimously with the revision as stated by Mr. Miller.

3. Public Hearings

3.a. Conditional Use Permit PC 16-02 – 6757 Olive Boulevard – Proposal for a daycare facility in the "IC" – Industrial Commercial District – Urban Sprouts Child Development Center

The applicant, Mark Groenda with Blackline Design and Construction, on behalf of Ellicia Qualls with Urban Sprouts Child Development Center, and Steve Hoover with JEMA Studio, one of the project architects, were all present. The public hearing notification

requirements had been met. The Chairperson noted the Commission's procedures and criteria for reviewing Conditional Use Permits and amendments (Zoning Code Section 400.2720).

Mr. Greatens provided an overview of maps and images of the site and surrounding area.

Ms. Qualls and Mr. Hoover explained the proposal to reuse the existing building (formerly office-warehouse for McCarthy Spice Co.) for a child care center. Improvements to the site would include a play area to the rear of the building, new landscaping, and one-way traffic circulation with entrance-only from Olive Boulevard and exit-only onto the adjacent alley. The play area would be fenced. There were parallel parking spaces proposed on the private property, adjacent to the alley. Ms. Qualls stated the proposal was to move their current locations, one in University City and one in Olivette, to this location once completed.

Questions / Comments and Discussion by Plan Commission

- The width and use of the alley, location of the proposed parallel parking spaces, proposed fencing, play area, and vehicular access to the alley were all discussed. The applicant stated that the parallel parking spaces were on the private property, not encroaching onto the alley.
- There was concern about the amount of room that vehicles from the residential properties would have to back out if they parked their vehicles in the rear yard, adjacent to the alley. Staff stated that the issue was discussed with Department of Public Works and Parks staff. The proposed development would allow sufficient room for vehicles to back out, if they use their rear yard for parking.
- The number of parking spaces provided if the facility were to reach capacity, which was stated as 128 students, and parking for any special events was discussed. The applicant stated that the proposed parking would meet their needs. They already reached out to the surrounding businesses and if there were any special evening programs in the future, they intended to discuss such matters with adjacent property owners.
- The potential for additional traffic on the alley was discussed. There was concern about vehicles exiting the property in winter months and the impact of headlights on the residential properties to the north. Members discussed options for additional buffering for the residential properties and use of signage to address traffic flow onto the alley.

The Chairperson opened the public hearing.

Jeff Hales, 7471 Kingsbury Boulevard – Mr. Hales stated he was a member of the University City Traffic Commission but was speaking as an individual, not a representative of the Traffic Commission. He had concerns about the proposed ingress and egress, parking, and potential traffic issues. He requested that the Department of Public Works and Parks would bring this item to the Traffic Commission for review.

With no other members of the public requesting to speak, the Chairperson closed the public hearing.

Mr. Hoover clarified the location of the parallel parking spaces and stated they would not be in the alley right-of-way but on the private property. The exit to the alley would be gated.

Traffic onto the alley would be dispersed and there would not be an issue with trash collection on the alley.

Questions / Comments and Discussion by Plan Commission

- It was stated that the property had been zoned commercial for decades and the residents who lived nearby were used to the way the alley functioned with the businesses on Olive.
- Typically traffic flow would go back out to the main street. The applicant stated that the proposed traffic circulation was intended to address safety and the proposal would eliminate left-hand turns onto Olive Boulevard, where there is no middle turn-lane at this location.
- The applicant stated she had spoken with all businesses between Kingsland and Ferguson.
- Plan Commission members discussed adding a requirement for the applicant to provide additional buffering on residential properties directly north of the subject site to block headlights if those property owners so desired.

A motion was made by Mr. Miller to recommend approval of the Conditional Use Permit application with the conditions set forth in Attachment B of the staff report with an additional requirement that applicant provide landscape buffering on the residential properties directly north of the site, if desired by those property owners.

Questions / Comments and Discussion by Plan Commission

- This was a good project and while there were concerns about the additional traffic on the alley, the safety would be improved with the proposed layout.
- The concerns discussed were technical. However, it should not become a habit to increase traffic on alleys.
- The proposal would provide a service that was needed in the area.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Salamon and carried unanimously.

The Chairperson stated that the next step was for City Council consideration of the application.

6.a. Zoning Text Amendment – PC 16-03 – Proposed Zoning Code Text Amendments pertaining to the Civic Complex Historic District

Mr. Greatens explained the proposal and provided background information. The proposal was to amend the Zoning Code Section that sets forth the boundaries for the Civic Complex Historic District, a locally designated historic district, to add the old University City Library building located at 630 Trinity Avenue. The Code Review Committee recommended approval of the Text Amendment at their July 12 meeting. The Historic Preservation Commission recommended approval of the Text Amendment at their June 16 meeting.

Mr. Miller made a motion to approve the proposed Text Amendments as reflected in the material distributed to the Plan Commission. The motion was seconded by Ms. Moran and carried by a vote of 5 to 0. Ms. Locke abstained.

7. Other Business

7.a. Work Session – Centene Clayton Campus Expansion project - Proposed Zoning Map Amendment / Development Plan – 7440 Forsyth Boulevard from PD-M Planned Development – Mixed-Use District to Amended PD-M Planned Development Mixed-Use District for part of a mixed-use development in Clayton and University City

Mr. Greatens provided an overview of the PD – Planned Development District rezoning process and provided a map and images of the site for background information. He stated that Traffic Commission and Green Practices Commission members were invited to attend tonight's meeting to learn about the project early in the process. They were welcome to ask questions and provide comments as individuals at tonight's meeting.

Mr. Larry Chapman with Clayco provided a summary of the project for the Plan Commission members. The proposal was to expand the existing Centene headquarters located in Clayton with a four-phase project that included office space, corporate lodging, a corporate civic auditorium, retail, and structured parking. The third phase of the project includes the University City portion. He stated that the proposed development would be pedestrian friendly and take advantage of the proximity to the Metrolink station on Forsyth Boulevard. He stated there were still changes that would be made to the current plans.

Questions / Comments and Discussion by Plan Commission

- Would the auditorium include public use? Mr. Chapman stated it was possible as it might provide a tourism element to the development.
- Would the retail space be one-story? Mr. Chapman stated the parking garage would include first floor, street-level, retail. It was intended to be multi-functional, in case the retail market is not strong and there might be opportunities for other commercial uses.
- How many cars would the parking garage fit? Mr. Chapman stated it was for approximately 900 cars.
- What visual impact would the parking garage have? Mr. Chapman stated the parking garage would be design to not look like a parking garage. He mentioned the existing Centene headquarters to the west the parking garage was designed to not look like a parking garage.
- What would the timeframe for development be? Mr. Chapman stated their intent was to start construction in November or December and complete the project in 2019.
 - Mr. Chapman stated there team had just received the traffic study today. There would likely be some changes to the plans as a result of the information and recommendations in the traffic study.
- What is proposed for the frontage along the access drive? Would it look like a service entrance or would it have more of a retail façade? Mr. Chapman stated the parking garage would not look like a parking garage.

Traffic Commission member Jeff Hales stated his concern about the number of vehicles and access to/from the site. Access to Carondelet Plaza was critical due to the volume of traffic.

- Why only 1,500 square feet of retail proposed in University City? Mr. Chapman stated that the retail space was not fully designed yet. What was shown in the drawing was more of a placeholder.

The Chairperson asked if any members of the public had comments.

Brian Burkett, 7471 Kingsbury Boulevard – Mr. Burkett stated most of his questions had been answered at tonight's meeting. He stated the retail with frontage on Forsyth was critical to the development. Access from the proposed garage to Carondelet Plaza would be important due to the potential traffic volume.

There were no further public comments.

8. Reports

8.a. Code Review Committee Report

Mr. Miller stated that the Code Review Committee met earlier in the month to consider the proposed Text Amendments previously discussed and there was no further information to add.

8.b. Comprehensive Plan Committee Report

Ms. Moran stated that there were two upcoming Comprehensive Plan Advisory Committee (CPAC) meetings on August 10 and August 15. The CPAC was working toward completion a draft document for public review.
