Community Stands Together

In Response to Chesed Shel Emeth Cemetery Desecration

After the desecration of the Chesed Shel Emeth Cemetery was discovered, the University City and wider St. Louis community came together and responded forcefully to this horrible event.

On Wednesday, February 23rd, various organizations in the St. Louis region, including the Jewish Federation and the Jewish Community Relations Council, came together to organize a clean-up at the cemetery. About 2,500 people were at the cemetery to help – including Missouri Governor Eric Greitens and the Vice President of the United States, Mike Pence.

Members of the University City Ministerial Alliance came together to release a letter of support to our neighbors. A portion of that letter reads:

We write as members of the University City Ministerial Alliance, representing religious communities as diverse as the city we call home. We respect one another and are committed to the religious diversity and freedom that make this community great. Although we come from varied belief systems and religious practices, one belief that we share is that the recent act of vandalism at Chesed Shel Emeth at Olive and Hanley is an act of hatred that we denounce in the strongest terms. This act of violence occurs in a context of increased public fear, bigotry, anti-Semitism, Islamophobia, xenophobia, and racism. We believe that silence is violence in the face of injustice. We commit ourselves and our congregations to teaching and preaching against bigotry and for beloved community.

Adegboye, Lauren Masterson and Zuleyma Tang-Martinez organized a community gathering to bring residents together to make it clear that this type of vandalism would not be tolerated in University City.

The University of Missouri in St. Louis supported this effort with an art project, which allowed those in attendance to use art to express their feelings about the cemetery desecration and its aftermath.



There was a short program presented, where members of the community and local religious leaders, including an imam, spoke.

The Jewish Cemetery Restoration and Security Fund is collecting donations in response to the desecration. Information on that fund can be found by going to the Jewish Federation home page of JFEDSTL.org and clicking on How To Give.

The Anti-Defamation League has offered a \$10,000 reward, with the generous assistance of the Mizel Family Foundation, for information leading to the arrest, prosecution and conviction of the perpetrator or perpetrators in the cemetery desecration. Police Report:

Vandalism at Chesed Shell Emeth Cemetery by Captain Fredrick Lemons II



On February 20, 2017 the University City Police Department was notified of vandalism at the Chesed Shel Emeth Cemetery. located at 7550 Olive. The investigation revealed that more than 150 monument stones had been toppled to the ground. The police

department has expended extraordinary amounts of manpower to investigate this horrific incident and bring the perpetrators to justice. Although the perpetrator(s) of this horrific act have yet to be identified, arrested or prosecuted, the Police Department will continue to vigorously investigate this crime in attempts to bring the suspects to justice.

The public outcry over this despicable act galvanized this community. Chief Larry Hampton and the entire Police Department want to thank the public for their support and the numerous tips. The Police Department also wants to thank the Anti-Defamation League for offering the \$10,000 reward for information leading to the identification, arrest, and prosecution of the perpetrators.

The Police Department continues to ask for the public's assistance in identifying any possible suspects.

I'm happy to say that reality is here. Together with Councilmember Paulette Carr, we informed City Staff of a development opportunity which has led to the creation and submission of a Request for Proposal (RFP) for Olive.

Make no mistake, we will continue moving forward, and to do this involves some necessary actions; actions which might be considered unpopular. I get that, there are two sides to every story. I will be as open, transparent, accessible to citizens and accountable for my actions, be it a vote, comment, or response to calls, emails, or in-person concerns about my Attack Mode approach as a councilmember. Let us attack and defeat road blocks to our future, and let us attack together and not be divided on issues that benefit us all.

Get Ready For Spring Property Maintenance Reminders



With warmer weather approaching the St. Louis area, it will soon be time to work on outdoor projects! Here are a few tips to keep your property well maintained and reminders about the City's property maintenance code:

Grass-cutting - Maintain your lawn and keep the grass under seven inches. Grass clippings should be placed in biodegradable bags to be picked up by the City on your regular trash and recycling collection day.

Weeds - Remove weeds that are growing on trees, houses, or fences.

Curbside leaf collection – If you missed the March collection, the two remaining collection periods in 2017 will be between late October and mid-December, depending on the location of your property. Call 314.505.8560 or visit http://www.ucitymo.org/705/Yard-Waste-Leaf-Collection-Mulch for details.

Painting – Warmer season is coming... now is the time to paint and stain the exterior of your home e. shutters, front door, walls, and garage. Reminder - flaky paint on the exterior of your house and garage should be addressed immediately.

Derelict vehicles - Remove any inoperable or un-licensed vehicles from the property or store them in an enclosed garage.

Gutter-cleaning - Overflowing or clogged gutters can damage your home or roof in a number of ways. Remove all debris from the gutters and downspouts by flashing or vacuuming. Debris must be discharged onto your own property, not your neighbor's.

Tree lawn - Maintenance of the tree lawn area between the front property line and the street is the responsibility of the owner of private property.

Trash receptacles – When not placed at the curb for pickup, place your waste and recycling receptacles behind the front wall of your house or garage.

Bulk item pick-up – If you missed the spring bulk item pick-up in April, the next free bulk collection by the City will be in September. In the interim, you may arrange a special pick-up on a per use fee basis with the Department of Public Works and Parks. Yard Waste Program



Grass, leaves, twigs, plants, or small brush must be placed in biodegradable paper bags, which can be purchased from local hardware, discount or grocery stores. The bags with a sticker will be picked up from the front curb on the

same day as your trash and/or recycling collection. Each bag must have a yard waste sticker attached. A yard waste sticker is required on each biodegradable paper bag from January 1 through October 14 each year.

Residents must follow these guidelines for yard waste disposal:

Leaves and grass must be placed in brown, biodegradable paper bags with a City yard waste sticker attached.

No dirt, wood chips, or logs are accepted in the yard bags.

All brush must be tied in bundles no larger than 4' by 2' wide, with branches no thicker than 3 inches in diameter.

Yard waste is picked up on the same day as trash and recycling.

For the convenience of University City residents, a number of locations are available where yard waste stickers are sold. The stickers are available in packs of 5 for \$7.50.
