A sampling of events during Lunar New Year include: Friday, February 19, traditional 10-Course Lunar New Year Banquets will be hosted by participating

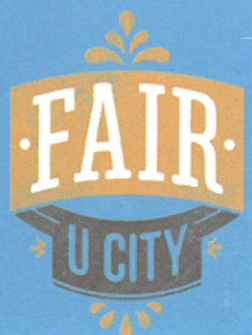

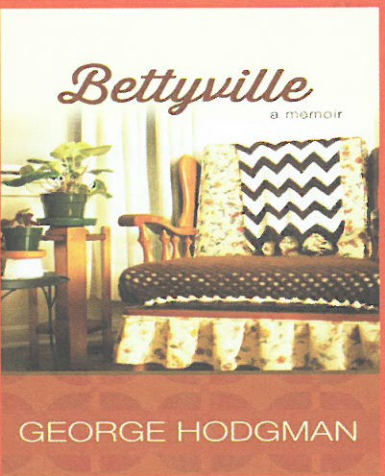

For more than 30 years U City in Bloom has partnered with the City, the School district, the Library, and the U City Public Works and Parks Department. But most importantly we have had YOU on our team. As a UCB supporter you have helped with:

Mayor Welsch Part of Compact of Mayors Nationwide Supporting Climate Initiatives

University City Mayor Shelley Welsch joined St. Louis Mayor Francis Slay and the Compact of Mayors in support of an initiative supporting efforts to protect the climate as part of the December 2015 United Nations Climate Summit in Paris. Welsch and Slay, the only two mayors in Missouri to support this initiative, have joined mayors in over 100 cities across the U.S.

Launched at the 2014 United Nations Climate Summit, the Compact of Mayors is a global coalition of mayors and city officials pledging to reduce local greenhouse gas emissions, enhance resilience to climate change, and track their progress transparently. Commitment to the Compact means cities and towns must actively, and publicly, demonstrate their efforts to fight climate change and adapt to it. The significance of these efforts is captured through consistent, transparent reporting of climate data—with an overarching goal to drive more aggressive local actions and reaffirm existing targets.

UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon, his Special Envoy Michael R. Bloomberg, and global city networks ICLEI-Local Governments for Sustainability (ICLEI), C40

Cities Climate Leadership Group (C40) and United Cities and Local Governments (UCLG), with support from UN Habitat, formed the Compact of Mayors to empower and engage cities of all shapes and sizes to accelerate local climate action in the lead up to the UN Climate Conference in Paris/Le Bouget. Through the collective successes achieved at the local level, cities can contribute to and support national commitments as momentum builds toward Paris. However, the real value is the work that will happen after, as cities continue to meet milestones they have committed to and report on their progress.

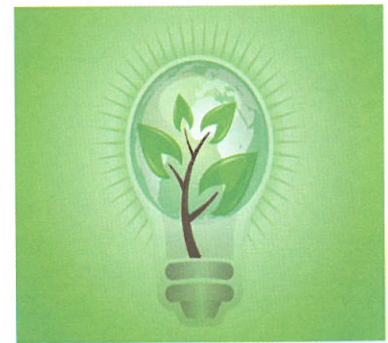
“I am very proud to join with Mayor Slay and the other mayors across our country in this Compact,” said Welsch. “We can truly make a difference in our cities, the region and the world by helping produce cleaner air. I believe this is something all University City residents can get behind.”

City Hall and Centennial Commons have NEW Energy Efficient Lighting!

The decorative lights in front of City Hall were outdated, discolored, inefficient, and labor intensive for maintenance and repair. Because these fixtures were historical cast iron decorative fixtures, replacing them would be costly. The total cost of replacing the fixtures was greatly reduced by utilizing spare parts from a project on Olive Blvd. and LED conversion kits for the fixtures. This replacement has reduced the energy usage by 75% and has increased the light output by 150%.

The City has replaced the dim and inefficient parking lot fixtures at Centennial Commons with new lower energy high light output LED fixtures. This replacement will save the City approximately \$4,000 per year; the cost of this replacement will be paid for in two years with the energy savings. After that the City will realize total savings. The soccer-turf lighting has also been replaced with energy efficient LED lighting. The previous fixtures



were inefficient and labor-intensive to maintain this replacement will save the City approximately \$6,000 per year. This replacement has a three year payback.

These projects were funded by the Missouri Department of Energy - Low Interest Energy Loan Program. This loan is for energy efficient projects on City owned property. This loan is a great opportunity for the City to fulfil its commitment to the energy efficiency ordinance signed by City Council in April 2014. This ordinance states that energy efficient and sustainable building techniques reduce fossil fuel use and can save the taxpayer money over the useful life of the investment in public buildings.

Millar Park Trail Renovation

On March 1, 2014, the City entered into an agreement with the State of Missouri to renovate the trail in Millar Park. This renovation was to include: widening the trail to a consistent eight ft., adding a connection to the street at the southeast corner of the park, additional lighting, drinking fountains, and landscaping.

The first year of the project was spent in design. In late summer 2015, construction began on the project and work was completed in late November 2015. This was the second phase of the Millar Park Master Plan; it is to be completed using grant funds to supplement City funds.

The third phase of Millar Park is currently under construction; by the summer of 2016 all improvements included in the Millar Park Master Plan will have been seen to completion.

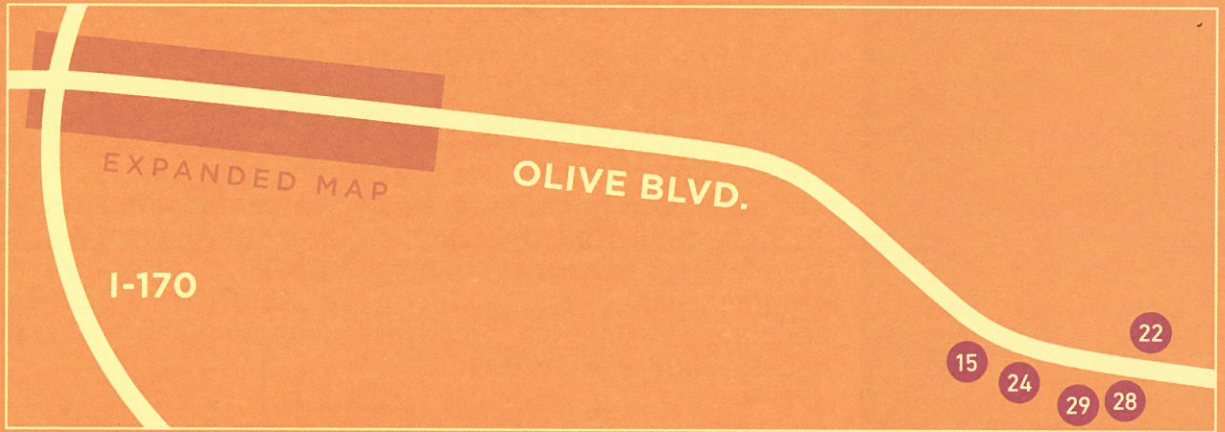

The City is Now Accepting Applications For Use of Economic Development Retail Sales Tax

The City of University City is now accepting applications for the FY 17 Economic Development Retail Sales Tax (EDRST) funds. The funds have been raised through a ¼ cent sales tax since 2006 and generate approximately \$500,000 annually for economic development activities. Programs and projects that are eligible to receive EDRST funds are restricted to those spelled out by City ordinance.

Through the EDRST, funds are being invested in University City economic developmental related programs and projects. The City must ensure that these investments are eligible for funding and meet certain criteria. Past projects include: the physical and economic redevelopment that these investments include physical and economic redevelopment of major corridors, improvement to infrastructure, support of existing business districts, and enhancement efforts toward business retention, expansion and attraction. A five-member volunteer Economic Development

Retail Sales Tax Board helps to oversee the use of the EDRST and serves in an advisory capacity to City Council. The Board is currently accepting applications from organizations now through February 5, 2016 for use of the funds.

“The Economic Development Retail Sales Tax was created with the vision of helping keep University City a great place to attract and retain businesses,” said Jodie Lloyd, Manager of Economic Development. “We hope to put these funds towards some worthwhile and exciting projects in the City.”

The EDRST is generally open to any organization, with priority given to non-profit and City sponsored projects. Donation of Land on Wilson Avenue

In September 2008, the City of University City was inundated by rain from Hurricane Ike. The rain came so quickly that major flash flooding occurred, resulting in the loss of two (2) lives and countless property damage. In 2010, the City received federal funding to purchase homes on the east side of Wilson Avenue. One of the properties allocated for funding was never able to be acquired as part of the grant. After years of trying to track down the owner of the property, the City was put in contact with Damien Chiodo, President & Chairman of

KeyLink Family of Companies. When KeyLink was created, the company vision was to help transform dilapidated neighborhoods into parks and urban farms. It has been the City’s intention for the east side of Wilson Avenue to be zoned as Public Activity and never be built on again due to the floodplain, KeyLink was happy to approve the City’s request to acquire the property through the quit-claim process. In November 2015, the City officially acquired 1138 Wilson Avenue.



Holiday Tree Pick-up Guidelines

City staff will collect Holiday trees (without decorations or lights) when placed at the front curb during the first two weeks of January. Please place trees at the front curb on your regularly scheduled trash collection day during the weeks of January 4 and January 11, 2016. Please do not place Christmas trees in trash or recycle carts or in City alleys.

Holiday Light Recycling Drive - 2016

The City of University City is proud to again be a participant in the annual holiday light recycling drive. A collection container is located in the basement level of City Hall. This container will be available until January 18th, 2016.
