Swearing-In of New Board Members: LaRette Reese swore in new board members Mohammed Qadadeh, Kumar Satish, Mary Gorman & Dan Wald.

Resignation of Chair: Board Chairman Joe Edwards announced that he would be resigning as Chair of the LSBD at the conclusion of the January 12, 2021 Board meeting. Mayor Terry Crow thanked Chairman Edwards for his years of service to the LSBD. The board election was determined to be held on Friday, January 22, 2021 at 10 a.m.

Call to Order: Board Chairman Joe Edwards called the meeting to order at 10:12 a.m. and took attendance of those on the call.

Public Comments: There were no requests to speak.

Approval of the Minutes: Chairman Joe Edwards requested minor changes in the minutes and asked for a roll call vote to amend the minutes as suggested. The motion carried.

Security Update: Captain Fredrick Lemons thanked the LSBD for providing lunch to the University City police department as part of the "Pay it Forward" giveback program for first responders. An incident was reported in parking lot 4 of a robbery, and three juvenile suspects were taken into custody a few hours later and warrants were issued for their arrest. Increased patrols will take place in the University City Loop as the weather begins to warm up.

The police department will start sending out monthly business tips to all University City businesses to help with any possible security matters and provide insight on how to make businesses more secure.

Any businesses in University City that have active surveillance systems are encouraged to sign up for the community camera program with the University City police.

City Hall Updates: Cliff Cross announced that the federal Paycheck Protection Program has reopened and round 3 of the EDRST fund program has been completed. Parameters for a fourth round of funding are currently being discussed.

Steve Stone announced he is replacing the storefronts and adding new lighting to his building at Kingsland and Delmar.

Loop Trolley Update: Chairman Edwards reported income for the Loop Trolley Company is down by approximately 40%. The balance in the Loop Trolley TDD bank account is approximately \$750,000.

LSBD Budget Process Discussion: Jessica Bueler explained the LSBD budget is funded by property tax and business license fees and the fiscal year begins on July 1 and ends on June 30. The LSBD will need to create a budget and submit to University City Council for approval. Mohammed Qadadeh suggested that the Activities Committee come up with a proposed budget for the LSBD and make a recommendation. Steve Stone agreed with the approach and stated an emphasis needs to be on marketing and special events. Steve inquired about how much money is currently in the LSBD account and Michael Alter said he would contact Finance Director Keith Cole to find out the total.

LSBD Activities Committee Report: Michael Alter reported that the LSBD created two different events that were funded and ready to go in 2020 but had to be canceled due to the pandemic and we need to keep this in mind as we move forward in planning. Michael suggested the Activities Committee get together as soon as possible to start planning for 2021. Jessica Bueler reported that 787 meals have been donated for frontline essentials workers through the "Pay it Forward" give back program.

University City Loop Website: Ryan Griffore presented the new University City Loop website at UniversityCityLoop.com. Functionalities include a business directory, events, news, social, history, and contact page.

Steve Stone asked how the East Loop CID would be working with the LSBD moving forward in the spirit of collaboration. City Attorney John Mulligan read the response from the East CID regarding the website and use of logo. The East Loop CID recognizes "Delmar Loop" as a generic term used by the public and beleives neither St. Louis City or University City has ownership of the logo. The East Loop CID stated they have sole control of the VisitTheLoop.com website and is willing to update the University City business information in the directory or create posts on social media outlets for an additional fee.

Michael Alter suggested that some LSBD board members volunteer to work with City Attorney John Mulligan to take ownership back of the LSBD property. Steve Stone volunteered to work with John Mulligan.

Strategic Plan Updated: Chairman Edwards confirmed that the i5 Group would working with the LSBD in January 2021. Joe Edwards, Steve Stone, Dan Wald and Jessica Bueler will meet with i5 Group when they are ready. The project length would be 9 months at a cost of \$15,000.

Trash Collection and Street Cleanup: Chairman Edwards reported that Scottie Floyd had been doing the trash collection over the past 3-4 years and was paid \$15 per hour for 40 hour per week. Dan Wald volunteered to speak with Scottie Floyd and get bids from two others as well.

Gift Card Program: Michael Alter reported that there was a gift card program in place for the LSBD for Small Business Saturday, but it was cancelled due to Covid-19 and the restaurants being closed in St. Louis County on November 17, 2020.

Duck Walk: Chairman Edwards reported that next to the Chuck Berry statue, he would like to install a cross walk light of Chuck Berry doing the Duck Walk. The project is estimated to cost \$20,000.

Announcements: Chairman Edwards announced that the next LSBD Board Meeting will be held virtually on Zoom on Tuesday, January 12, 2020 at 10:00 a.m. Explore St. Louis is holding a virtual meeting to discuss holiday promotions on Wednesday, December 9, 2020 at 2:00 p.m.

Having no further business, a motion was made to adjourn by Dan Wald and seconded by Mary Gorman. The motion passed unanimously.

The meeting adjourned at 12:08 p.m.

Annual Meeting of University City Loop Special Business District Via Tele Conference June 26, 2020 at 10:00 a.m.

Attending Board Members: Nikita Smith, Michael Alter, Joe Edwards, Wendy Harris, Ryan Patterson, Tom Schmidt, Steve Stone.

Others on the Call: John Mulligan (City Attorney), Cliff Cross (Director of Planning), Jessica Bueler (Contractor)

Call to Order: Board Chairman Joe Edwards called the meeting to order at 10:03 a.m. and took attendance.

Approval of the Minutes: Nikita Smith made a motion to approve the minutes, Wendy Harris seconded the motion, the motion carries unanimously.

Public Comments: Dan Wald submitted a public comment on if the TDD funds could be distributed to the TDD businesses since the trolley was not operational.

Joe Edwards explained that if the trolley does not restart, the LSBD can look at restoring the street and disbursing funds from the TDD, but he is optimistic.

Ryan Patterson asked if the \$300k bond to restore Delmar if the trolley project does not succeed is still in place. John Mulligan stated that \$300k is not enough to restore the street and asked when the bond expires. University City also has a conditional use permit that will be expiring in the near future for the trolley. Joe Edwards will look into the expiration dates and report back on July 14, 2020 at the next LSBD meeting.

University City Update: Cliff Cross began discussing the formal Administration Request from stated that Section 120 of City Code states that the LSBD needs to file an annual report, budget, and take minutes.

An example of things that could be formally requested from the city of University City is administration tasks to create the agenda, take minutes, legal assistance, and assistance from the finance department.

Joe Edward's suggestions of items to review as a board would be their current insurance policy, because the provider they are currently using will not be renewing the LSBD's policy.

Joe Edwards would like City Hall to take the minutes, like Libbey used to do as that was very helpful and assistance from University City to help with the annual report and would like to make a formal request.

Tom Schmidt inquired to know if KEB should still do the accounting or turn it over to the city.

Michael Alter requested to circle back to the conversation about insurance and that there is a line budget for \$3k for LSBD insurance coverage. He also asked if other commissions in University City pay for insurance.

Cliff Cross explained the LSBD is funded by a different source than other commissions, so it's a different entity with different bylaws. The short answer is no, other commissions do not have insurance because they are not an outside taxing district.

Joe Edwards would like to formally request that the city do the accounting and financial reports, the annual report, minutes, and insurance.

John Mulligan explained that University City is going to have to determine the cost to provide these services and need to address this before making a decision. John Mulligan said he does not have the authority to do agree to this, only to pass on the recommendation.

Tom Schmit says there is a budget line item in the LSBD budget for for \$2,400 for accounting and for the annual audit of \$600.

Michael Alter wants to know if other commissions pay their full accounting costs.

John Mulligan says the LSBD is a separate political subdivision. Other commissions are not, with the exemption of Parkview Gardens. But he cannot think of any other commissions that are a political subdivision that are funded by taxes and other fees that are imposed on those jurisdictions. The other University City commissions are advisory and do not have their own separate budget or taxing district. That is why the other commissions are an arm of University City and fall under their umbrella, the LSBD is separate.

Michael Alter thinks there may be inconsistency between what is being asked of the LSBD versus other University City Commissions.

Dan Wald said the Parkview Gardens does have additional requirements than all other University City commissions because he has been the Vice President of the organization for the past 20 years. He clarified that what is being asked of the LSBD is the same as what is expected from the Parkview Gardens Association.

John Mulligan understands the point raised by Michael Alter, but would like to make it clear when the LSBD was created there were regulations put in place, some required under state law and some are best practices; bylaws, annual report, taking minutes, among other items are all specifically listed in the code. These requirements are not new and there's recently been questions of if these procedures have been followed. The City Manager wants to ensure that the LSBD is following proper procedures because the University City Council has jurisdiction over the LSBD and they want to ensure if everything is being followed.

City Administrative Assistance Request/Needs of Board: Tom Schmidt made a motion that insurance, taking minutes, and filing the annual report. Michael Alter seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

Bylaw Updates: The discussion began regarding LSBD Bylaws Updates. John Mulligan asked procedures of notifying LSBD members for annual meetings and voting rights. The important item to address is that elections are held for the members.

John Mulligan explained that the University City Council passed an ordinance on March 10, 2020 that made key changes to the LSBD board that there is an appointment process that involves any interested individual who would like to become a board member, fill out an application that is furnished by the City Clerk, and return to the City Clerk so that the filing may be made public and passed on to Councilmembers for their review before making LSBD Board member appointments. John Mulligan clarified that the University City Council makes the appointments, not the LSBD.

John Mulligan reiterates that there is nothing in the ordinance for the members-at-large to govern the operations of the LSBD. In terms of providing some governance authority, the LSBD does not have the ability to do so.

John Mulligan explained the elections are advisory, but in the past, whomever is elected may very-well be appointed. The LSBD may recommend board members to be appointed by University City Council. The University City Council has discussed and concluded that they want the appointment process sanctioned by the University City Council.

Ryan Patterson says he is unsure of how to change the bylaws because he does not think that there is a system in place to make the changes.

John Mulligan said the ordinance trumps the bylaws and he would by happy to help create a draft of new bylaws for the LSBD and could submit those to be voted on or not.

Joe Edwards noted that it's difficult to get the 10 days notice out in advance as according to LSBD bylaws.

John Mulligan said that bylaws address in article 7 that the board is to hold at least 1 annual meeting and must give 10 days notice via fax, mail, hand-delivery. If the LSBD would like a different form of notice, that's up to the LSBD in terms of contacting these individuals who own property or own a business. The goal of this notice is to be transparent in that the LSBD is inviting members to the meeting, it does not mean the LSBD is requesting the members to vote on any agenda items. This is in addition to the sunshine laws to be a transparent entity so that all LSBD members' voices may be heard.

Joe Edwards suggested amending the bylaws so that the notice is being sent in the monthly LSBD newsletters. He believes this would save a lot of time and simplify the process for when he sends out the notices.

Cliff Cross explained that the bylaws cannot be inconsistent with the ordinance. The ordinance says members-at-large must be noticed, if the LSBD would like to amend their bylaws, they have the authority to make those changes with the proper vote.

Joe Edwards expressed that he would like to change LSBD bylaws to make it easier for him to send out the notices via the monthly newsletter, instead of mail, fax, or hand-delivery.

Ryan Patterson says the LSBD is considering changing their bylaw language from "members-at-large" to "members of the district" so that the LSBD does not need to be required to follow the guidelines for members at large in providing the 10-days notice for the annual meeting.

John Mulligan clarified this is that there is no members-at-large phrase in the code. In the code it says all property owners and individuals who are operating a business with a municipal license.

John Mulligan read that Code 129.50 requires the LSBD board is to hold at least one annual meeting and members are actively encouraged to participate in the budget and in reviewing it.

Steve Stone is not sure if the LSBD is still voting on board members, eligibility, and number of votes and if the council made a decision on this and on the bylaws.

John Mulligan said the application process in the ordinance passed in March states that no individual may be considered unless the individual has submitted an application to the city clerk. Once the application is submitted, the University City Council will consider it with any others with appointments to the board. As far as the internal election that the LSBD holds each year, that is not addressed in the ordinance. The University City

Council is not bound by the LSBD internal election. Although in practice, for many years, those who were elected were appointed. This, however, is not a requirement.

Steve Stone would like to ask if there is a purpose of continuing to hold elections if there is no authority granted to the LSBD in making the appointments.

Joe Edwards explained that for the last 40 years, the University City Council has always confirmed who was chosen by the LSBD election. The University City Council has followed the lead of the LSBD leadership. It should be taken into account that the LSBD self-taxed the district and therefore should have authority to appointment the LSBD board members.

Ryan Patterson reiterated that the LSBD has never actually had that authority to define who has to be on the board. University City has always had the authority to make the appointments, but that has only become clear to him and other board members recently.

John Mulligan explained that the amendment in March passed by University City Council stated that anyone appointed must be a business owner or property owner. So the eligibility standard has not changed in regards to being a property owner or business owner. Therefore, there will never be anyone appointed by University City Council who isn't a stakeholder.

Ryan Patterson requested clarification on if a designated employee of the business is eligible to run as an LSBD Board Member, instead of the business owner.

Joe Edwards said a designated legal representative may be appointed by the business owner, upon the business owner's approval.

Steve Stone requested to have a conversation of the number of votes each property owner is allowed to be allocated. Some property owners have more than one vote because they own more than one property. When Steve Stone was looking at this from the CID standpoint, Joe Edwards has 10-11 votes from his properties. We need to have a conversation about this.

Joe Edwards says he is fine discussing it in the future.

Michael Alter explained that he would like to have a discussion about COVID-19, this incredibly difficult time, what can the LSBD can do as a group and as a community to strengthen our businesses on the University City Loop. Specifically, Michael Alter would like to know, "How do we let LSBD businesses who were not invited to this call, get involved?".

Michael Alter explained that he knows that the LSBD bylaws are important, but there has not been any focus on how the LSBD board is going to take action to help promote the businesses. There needs to be a meeting scheduled immediately on how a marketing plan should be created to sustain the street.

Wendy Harris agreed with Michael Alter and emphasized this topic is of the utmost importance of how the LSBD is going to attract people back to the street.

Ryan Patterson agreed.

Nakita Smith thanks everyone for these comments and expressed her desire to get involved in helping create a group to focus on marketing.

Joe Edwards requested the conversation return to the bylaws and then schedule another meeting at a later day to address marketing.

Joe Edward said LSBD businesses need to take all of the plywood down from businesses to increase sales. He explained that Blueberry Hill's business picked up immediately once the boards were removed and others should do the same.

Michael Alter says one thing he would like to suggest is that the LSBD reconvenes on what we can do for marketing, events, and promotions. The LSBD needs to be highly creative and energetic right now in their approach to marketing. As early as next week would be wonderful for scheduling a meeting.

Reports: Joe Edwards requested from Cliff Cross if he may be provided with a report of the results of the survey of how COVID-19 has affected University City businesses.

Cliff Cross confirmed that he would follow up on this request for the next meeting.

Development Plan: Dan Wald explained that Mayor Terry Crow suggested Delmar Blvd be a big event that included music, food on the street, kid activities and sending the message to customers and residents that the University City Loop is open.

Nikita Smith said she supports the idea wholeheartedly and wants to create a "Love in The Loop" event or something similar.

Michael Alter explained that must bigger cities are setting up through fares to attract people back to other business districts.

Wendy Harris, Nikita Smith, and Dan Wald all agreed that they want to work with Michael Alter with marketing.

Dan Wald suggested the group create a plan to share with University City the benefits of shutting the street down and he would like to include city staff, such as Jenny Wendt who could help execute the plan.

A marketing committee was formed with the Nikita Smith, Michael Alter, Dan Wald, Wendy Harris, and Ryan Patterson that will schedule a time to meet next week.

Review & Approval of FY21 LSBD Budget: Joe Edwards asked if anyone wanted to make a motion to approve the budget. Wendy Harris made a motion to approve budget, Tom Schmidt seconded the motion, and it was approved.

Annual Report: Joe Edwards announced he put together the annual report and would be able to read to to everyone outline. Cliff Cross asked what the status was with the development plan.

Joe Edwards explained it was on hold for right now.

Cliff Cross inquired who was the coordinator of the plan.

Joe Edwards said he is waiting for the firm they hired to reach back out to finish the plan.

Joe Edwards requested that everyone on the call please send him business openings and closing, and contact information of new businesses including address, phone number, website, hours, etc. for the new directories that would be going to print next Monday.

Cliff Cross explained that when finalizing the LSBD budget, something to consider is how that budget is going to rotate around administration costs.

Joe Edwards said a proposal was sent to University City by the East Loop CID that had a \$20,000 cost for administration costs that has not been approved.

John Mulligan asked with respect to the annual report that Joe Edwards read out loud during this call, has this been voted on by the board and it has been approved.

Joe Edwards said he tried to cover all of the points in the annual report, it had not been voted on by the board, and he asked if the LSBD would like to vote on the annual report now.

Steve Stone said he would be happy to vote on it, but the LSBD Board members who are voting on the report would need to read first before voting on the annual report. Steve Stone expressed his appreciation to Joe Edwards for working on the plan and would like to have the board members read it before voting on it.

John Mulligan said that if COVID-19 is a factor in this annual report being delayed, the LSBD may want to think about requesting an extension. He explained that it may be more important to file an accurate report, rather than a quickly-generated report. John Mulligan said If the intention of the board is that they want to review the annual report first, there would not be a motion at this point and the annual report should be placed on the following meeting agenda.

Joe Edwards asked for someone to make a motion to approve the annual report.

Steve Stone made a motion to approve the annual report with addition of a supplement being submitted. Ryan Patterson seconded the motion. The motion was approved.

Tom Schmidt asked if there was any way to redirect EDRST funds to LSBD businesses.

Cliff Cross said the best answer at this time is that U City has a forgivable loan program with phases I and II already rolled out. Now there is a phase III being discussed with specific criteria that will open it up to more businesses.

Joe Edwards wanted to know if EDRST money that was pre-approved for an event, could be reallocated to the LSBD.

Cliff Cross says he understands the question, but if funds were approved by EDRST, no one cannot reallocate the funds without going back to the EDRST for approval.

Tom Schmidt explained that the Central West End bought \$100k of gift certificates for local businesses and used this as a marketing tool. Would it be possible for the the LSBD to do the same.

Ryan Patterson asked if buying gift certificates from businesses could be reallocated from an EDRST funded event that didn't' happen.

Cliff Cross says that request would have to be sent to EDRST.

Steve Stone wanted to know if the annual report could be emailed this afternoon so that it can be read by the board members.

Joe Edwards committed to sending the annual report to everyone this afternoon or evening.

Adjournment: Ryan Patterson made a motion to adjourn. Tom Schmidt seconded the motion and the meeting was adjorned.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:47 a.m.

Insurance Proposal: Chairman Edwards reported that the insurance information would be sent over to Cliff Cross and Keith Cole.

Invoice Processing: Joe Edwards explained that invoices processing will take place with Keith Cole at City of University City.

Annual Report: No Annual report has been conducted for the Loop Special Business District for the previous fiscal year. Chairman Edwards and Steve Stone will be working with the i5 Group in order for the Loop Special Business District to create a strategic plan.

Promotion Committee: Tom Schmidt suggested that the LSBD Board should vote on a proposal to present to University City for administrative services and a request EDRST funds from the previous year be carried forward to be allocated to the LSBD for future events in the amount of \$50,000.

Michal Alter said the goal is create a positive event for the street, but with the contingency of changing the date in case of another COVID-19 business shutdown. Right now is a difficult time for entrepreneurs so he suggest reaching out the businesses to solicit participation to find out what they would like to do for the event.

Tom Schmidt and Michael Alter have worked on creating a budget to assign to closing Delmar Blvd during Labor Day weekend for a "Love the Loop" event.

Chairman Edwards thanked everyone for their effort on working to put this event together and suggested that event take place on a side street instead of on Delmar.

Tom Schmidt explained the Central West End has been successfully closing Euclid Ave with type 3 barriers which has made a positive economic impact on the street. Michael Alter recalled that Delmar Blvd had been closed in the past for the bicycle race and we could look at what processes were followed for that event to be replicated for the Labor Day street closure.

Chairman Edwards enquired about the hours were being suggested that Delmar Blvd be closed. Tom Schmidt said the event was still being organized and the hours were to be determined, but he anticipated all day Sunday and Monday from 11am-10pm, or in the approximate range.

Michael Alter made a motion to close Delmar Blvd for Labor Day weekend for a University City Loop event. Nikita Smith seconded the motion. The vote carries unanimously.

Reports: Chairman Edwards reported that the new Loop Directory was being printed and would be ready for distribution in the next few weeks.

Chairman Edwards requested for the results of the COVID-19 survey that Libbey Tucker sent to businesses to see how the pandemic has affected business. Cliff Cross said he would report back with the results at the next meeting.

Stories about the Loop reopening generated 55 TV and Radio interviews with Nielson audience of 3,098,270 and generated a publicity value of \$80,417. The second biggest story was about Blueberry Hill with 36 TV and Radio interviews with Nielson audience of 1,488,280 and generated a publicity value of \$55,126. The St. Louis Walk of Fame with 14 TV and Radio interviews with Nielson audience of 308,286 and generated a publicity value of \$9,234. The Chuck Berry Statue 11 TV and Radio interviews with Nielson audience of 198,700 and generated a publicity value of \$10,173. Vintage Vinyl was featured on PBS in a 90-minute show.

Announcements: Chairman Edwards announced that the next LSBD Board Meeting will be held virtually on Zoom on Tuesday, September 8, 2020 at 10:00 a.m. Vintage Vinyl's has finished a one-hour show called Papa Ray's Vintage Vinyl Road Show will air on channel 9 on September 3, 2020 at 8:00 p.m. It will re-air on September 5 at 6:30 p.m. and September 8 at 8:30 p.m. New Loop brochures are out. The two pickup places are Componere Gallery and Moonrise Hotel.

Approval of the Minutes: Approval of the minutes did not take place because there was no custodian of records at this time.

Public Comments: There were no public comments.

City Hall Update: Cliff Cross shared that round 1 of the Forgivable loan program is complete and round 2 is open until August 21, 2020. Round 3 is being structured to provide an additional funding opportunity for University City businesses.

Joe Edwards asked about the results for the COVID survey and Cliff Cross and Jenny Wendt reported that 42 businesses responses and that there has been a decrease in revenue. The majority of businesses also reported that they have been forced to close temporarily due to COVID conditions.

Joe Edwards asked about the street performers that were back out on the street and requested an update. City Attorney John Mulligan reported that there is a lawsuit that has been filled in federal court by two street musicians. One idea that is currently being discussed is adopting an ordinance where all first amendment expressed activities could place in the loop. Additional updates will be provided at the next LSBD meeting.

LSBD Infrastructure Improvements: Jenny Wendt read a memo from Sinan Alpaslan stating that he will be working with the LSBD to develop a 5-year capital improvement plan for need infrastructure improvements. Examples include sidewalk and curb improvements, ADA improvements, street lighting, street tree grate improvements, traffic signal, parking lots, alley, drainage, building/sidewalk access improvements. If you have any suggestions, please send them to Sinan Alpaslan or Jessica Bueler.

Chairman Edwards stated that the i5 Group development plan for the LSBD has been put on hold for now, but they could be included in that discussion.

Security Update: Captain Fredrick Lemons said they have increased patrols, especially over the past few months in regards to protesting and with business reopen from COVID-19 restrictions. The University City Police Department has increased their number of officers on the weekends and they continue to have a Loop Special Business District officer during the day. If you have someone who is disturbing your peace or obstructing your business, the police will respond accordingly, but need the business owner to sign a summons or complaint so it can properly adjudicated and moved forward onto our municipal court.

Administrative Support Position and RFPs: Steve Stone suggested that the LSBD formally request administrative assistance from University City. Chairman Edwards agreed with the caveat that the LSBD board could review the proposal implementation. Cliff Cross explained that the specific needs of the LSBD should be identified so that a scope can be created for the position and then the cost can be identified.

Chairman Edwards reported that there have been four items identified and that he would submit a formal letter to City Manager Gregory Rose to request the administrative services needed.

Formalizing Loop Special District Activities Committee: Tom Schmidt requested to know if formalizing the Activities Committee was a requirement or recommendation of University City. Jenny Wendt reported that in the LSBD Bylaws it states, "that an Activities Committee shall be responsible for reviewing and making recommendations on all programs and activities proposed for the district and shall be responsible for administration of implementation of the same." This part of article 6 under Committees in the bylaws.

Chairman Edwards asked who would like to be on the Activities Committee. Michael Alter, Dan Wald, and Wendy Harris all volunteered to spearhead the group. Chairman Edwards asked someone would please reach out to Nikita Smith to see if she would like to be part of the Activities Committee.

Tom Schmidt reported that closing Delmar for a street festival has been indefinitely delayed due to the pandemic and St. Louis County Dept. of Health restrictions and requested to know if the "Love the Loop" proposal could be shifted for the drive-in movie events.

Jessica Bueler outlined the logistics of the drive-in movie events to ensure that all social distancing guidelines and St. Louis County Department of Health guidelines would be followed.

Explore St. Louis Membership Fees: Chairman Edwards reported that it has been a difficult year for Explore St. Louis memberships because of COVID-19, so the price has been reduced by 25% this year.
