Someone other than me may have a formal cold weather preparation checklist. These are things I think about: 1. Have enough batteries for flashlights. Keep phones and other battery operated devices charged. 2. Run any errands before the weather hits if you pick stuff up. (I may need to get more bird seed or have it delivered.) 3. Have some ice melt (or kitty litter or sand) just inside your doors or on your porches right next to the door. 4. Have a snow shovel handy near your door, and a broom (even if just a neighbor is going to come by and do it because you don't or should not.) 5. Have a friend or buddy you can check in with by phone or text every day so you don't feel too isolated. 6. Have a plan to move to a nearby hotel if we lose power...which one, and how you might get there. 7. Make sure you have enough medication on hand unless you know you can have it delivered. 8. Make sure your outdoor faucets are winterized if you have not already done so. Hoses should be disconnected. Home Depot and most hardware stores sell an insulated cover for your outdoor faucet. have an extra one if anybody needs one; I had a freeze proof faucet installed when a plumber was here for another reason a couple of years ago. 9. Check your pantry...do you have canned foods you could heat up easily or plenty of meals in the freezer? I have an electric stove so I have a little sterno stove to heat water and soup in a pan if the power goes out, even for a short time. 10.

Plan to dress in layers, even inside, when it gets below 20 if you don't already do so. 11. If you have pets make sure your gate is locked for when they go out, or if you don't have a secure fence, attach a tie-out leash to a porch railing in case you have to let them out and its too icy for you to accompany them. 12. Make sure you have enough pet food, too. Others will have other ideas, I'm sure.

My car lives in a garage and is a Prius, so I think I will be able to start it, and your post makes me realize that, worst case scenario, if we lose power, I could keep my phone charged using the car, and hopefully I can open the garage door without electricity. I am going to try that this weekend. I think that for hose faucets, if you turn off the water supply from inside and also leave the tap open, that helps. Hopefully, we will not lose power enough so that our homes get cold. I have an elderly cat who needs to stay warm, but I am going to assume that we are not going to have to deal with that. I noticed place where there are air leaks that I never noticed before, the edges of some steps that go to one of the bedrooms, but are over the basement and I plan to seal them with rope caulk. This is a great chance for a RELIABLE person to make themselves available for snow removal. Also, make sure you have cash on hand, just in case.

TIP: I have an older but great running vehicle. However, in very cold weather the doors seem to stick or freeze shut and the last thing I want in cold weather is to be locked out of my car. One thing I do is close a heavier plastic (like the large Sav A Lot ones) between the door and the lock as I close it and this has never failed me. My car door doesn't freeze shut. Also I've heard putting Vaseline on the rubber seals works great too. Haven't tried that though. I also carry ice melt, a scoop and a towel in my car in winter besides scrapers. I don't want to fall so I scope out parking spots not too far from the building I'm going into and if it's icy I put down some ice melt so I don't slip and fall. The towel is if I get stuck on an icy surface. I spread it out right next to and in front of the stuck tire and have successfully pulled right out. Love to see others tips.



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
