**MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING OF THE  
PARK COMMISSION  
CITY OF UNIVERSITY CITY, ST. LOUIS COUNTY, MISSOURI  
TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 15, 2022**

**Agenda Item A: Call Meeting to Order**

Park Commission President, James Wilke called the meeting to order at 6:37 pm.

**Agenda Item B: Roll Call**

Those in attendance included Commission President James Wilke, Park Commission Vice President, James Crowe, Commission Members Lisa Hummel, Su Schmaltz, Meg Ullman, and Carl Hoagland. Also, in attendance was Council Liaison Steve McMahon and Darren Dunkle, Director of Parks, Recreation and Forestry.

**Agenda Item C: Approval of the Agenda**

Commission Member Hoagland motioned, and Commission Vice President Crowe seconded to accept the Agenda. The motion was approved with a 6-0 vote.

**Agenda Item D: Approval of the Minutes**

Commission Vice President Crowe motioned, and Commission Member Hoagland seconded to amend the minutes to include the following change to Agenda Item J-1: New Business – to correct the spelling of “draught” to “drought”. The motion was approved with a 6-0 vote.

**Agenda Item E: Citizen Comments**

None.

**Agenda Item F: Department Report**

Mr. Dunkle highlighted the following:

- 1) Part-Time Compensation – Mr. Dunkle reported that the City Council approved the recommendation of the City Manager to raise the minimum wage of part-time parks and recreation employees.
- 2) Ackert Park Renovation – Mr. Dunkle reported that work began on December 7, 2021 and is scheduled to be completed in May of 2022.
- 3) Driving Range Repairs – Mr. Dunkle reported that the project was currently out to bid. He further stated that it was anticipated that a recommendation would be submitted for City Council approval in March, and that the project would begin in April and that the project could be completed by August, and that the Driving Range would be closed during this time period.
- 4) Centennial Commons Turf Replacement – Mr. Dunkle reported that the project was approved by City Council on 1/24/22, and that the work would begin in Summer so that it would not disrupt the soccer season.
- 5) UCity In Bloom Irrigation Project – Mr. Dunkle reported that staff prepared Bid specifications and went out to bid, and that the Bids are due on February 22<sup>nd</sup>.
- 6) Fees and Charges – Mr. Dunkle reported that based on the procedures outlined in the Revenue and Pricing Policy, staff continued to review the existing pricing. This is necessitated by the fact that fees and

charges in part have not been increased since 2004 and that increased fees will be needed to offset employee salaries.

- 7) Centennial Commons Operations – Mr. Dunkle reported that staff continues to work towards expanding the hours of Centennial Commons, and that Staffing still remains to be the number one issue; however, that with the minimum wage being increased, hopefully it will help in the recruitment and retainage of employees.

Commission Member Schmalz stated that the city should promote Centennial Commons more. A discussion followed regarding programs and operations, and that maybe the Commission/City should look at partnering with other cities and/or contract out with the YMCA.

#### **Agenda Item G: Council Report**

- 1) Council Liaison Steve McMahon reported that the city had closed on a property at the northeast corner of North and South to Quick Trip in the amount of \$1.1 million.
- 2) Mr. McMahon reported that no one other than incumbents would be running for the municipal election in April.
- 3) Mr. McMahon reported that the city is placing a ¼ cent sales tax on the ballot that would be dedicated to the Fire Department operations. He further stated that a portion of the funds could go towards the possible addition of a third ambulance and crew, as well as to go towards the pension.
- 4) Mr. McMahon reported that the city's pension fund is currently at 80% and that the city is comparing the current pension plan and benefits to what other municipalities are offering.
- 5) Mr. McMahon reported that the city had been able to take some of the excess dirt from the Costco project to be placed at the northwest corner of Olive and Midland. This would bring the property out of the flood plain and could make the property more inviting to possible developers.

#### **Agenda Item H: Commission Members Park Inspection Report**

- 1) Flynn Park Tennis Court Sign (Carl Hoagland) – Asked if the tennis court rules signs would only be placed at Flynn Park or would they be placed at all of the tennis court locations. Mr. Dunkle stated that they would be placed at all of the tennis court locations.
- 2) Maierus Park (James Crowe) – Stated that the pond had been frozen over due to the fact that the fountain was not in operation.
- 3) Inspection Reports – A discussion took place regarding inspections and inspection forms. Commission Member Hummel stated that she could send out a copy of the form to all of the Commission Members.

#### **Agenda Item I: Unfinished Business**

- 1) Park Priorities – Commission Member Hoagland presented the priorities and opened the floor for discussion.
  - a) Greensfelder Park – Discussion took place regarding Greensfelder Park and that there seemed to be a possible lack of interest/feedback from the residents regarding the park. Further discussion took place in regard to the possibility of leaving the park as open green space and only addressing the water and parking lot areas. The Commission stated that they would like to have this item on the March agenda for further discussion.

- b) Golf Course New Putting Green – Discussion took place for the need for a new putting green near the tee box of hole #1. It was determined that this was more of a want than a need and that this item should be dropped.
- c) Aquatic Center – Discussion took place for the need of an indoor pool at Centennial Commons. It was determined that this item should remain on the list as a low priority.
- d) Golf Course Short Game Practice Area – Discussion took place for the need to complete the project. It was determined that this item should remain on the list as a low priority due to the other needs of the golf course.
- e) Comprehensive Master Plan - Discussion took place for the need to move forward with updating the Parks Comprehensive Master Plan. The Commission stated that it should stay on the list but should wait until more information is available regarding MSD.
- f) Recreation Priorities – Commission Member Hoagland stated that the Commission had been focusing on the Park Priorities and now was the time to start focusing on the Recreation Priorities. Discussion took place regarding programming, partnerships, contracting out with the YMCA, etc. The Commission stated that they would like to have this item placed on the March Agenda for further discussion.

Commission Member Hummel motioned, and Commission Vice President Crowe seconded to approve the Park Priorities as presented and forward a recommendation on to the Council. The motion was approved with a 6-0 vote.

- 2) Parks Policies and Procedures – Commission President James Wilke stated that he would like for the Commission to begin a process to work with staff to review and update all parks policies and procedures. In doing so, he would like to see a sub-committee be developed to begin this process. A discussion by the Commission took place regarding the need to receive copies of all of the park’s policies and procedures as well as to receive a list of priorities from staff.

Commission Member Hoagland motioned, and Commission Member Hummel seconded to create a subcommittee to work with staff in the review and updating of the parks policies and procedures. The motion was approved with a 6-0 vote.

**Agenda Item J: New Business**

- 1) 2040 Task Force – Commission President James Wilke stated that the 2040 Task Force would be holding two public brainstorming meetings in the upcoming weeks. The first meeting will take place on Thursday, February 24<sup>th</sup> from 6:00pm – 9:00pm, and the second meeting will take place on Saturday, February the 26<sup>th</sup> from 9:00am – 12:00pm. Mr. Wilke stated that both of these meeting will take place at the Heman Park Community Center.

Commission Member Hummel made a motion at 8:04 pm, seconded by Commission Member Schmalz to adjourn. The motion was approved with a 6-0 vote.

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### ADMINISTRATION

1) Departmental Policies and Procedures

Continued to work on the development of a more formal documented system of policies and procedures. Once these policies and procedures have been developed, they will be submitted to the appropriate governing authority for review, comment, and approval when necessary.

2) Maintenance Investment/Improvement Plan, Capital Investment/Improvement Plan, Refurbishment/Replacement Plan.

Continued to work on the development of an overall plan to identify the maintenance and operational needs of the department. This plan will include itemized work, life cycles, estimated costs, etc.

3) FY23 Budget – Utilizing information gained from the Maintenance Investment/Improvement Plan, Capital Investment/Improvement Plan, and Refurbishment/Replacement Plan, staff is submitted FY23 operational and CIP budget needs.

4) Personnel

- a) Recreation Supervisor (Sports, Health & Fitness) – Vacant. Staff has been conducting interviews and should be making a recommendation for hire within the week.
- b) Recreation Supervisor (Programs and Special Events) – Vacant. Staff has been conducting interviews and should be making a recommendation within the next couple of days.
- c) Parks Maintenance Crew Leader – Vacant. Currently accepting applications.
- d) Parks Equipment Operator – Two positions are currently vacant. Currently accepting applications.
- e) Centennial Commons – The Recreation Division continues the process of recruiting, hiring, and training of part-time staff.
- f) Golf Course Attendants – Vacant. Currently accepting applications.
- g) Golf Course Part-time Laborer - Vacant. Currently accepting applications.
- h) Part-Time Personnel Compensation Plan – Was approved by City Council.

5) Training

- a) Deputy Director Todd Strubhart and I attended the Missouri Park and Recreation annual conference.
- b) Ken Morgan, Golf Superintendent and Mike Warmbold, Parks Supervisor attended the ABI Force (ballfield groomer/laser level training) on March 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup>.

6) **FY22 Capital Improvement Projects**

- a) Ackert Park Renovation (Construction) – Work began on December 7, 2021, and is scheduled to be completed in May of 2022.
- b) E.A.B. Program – Completed.
- c) Asphalt Trail Repairs at Heman Park – Completed.
- d) Pool Painting at Heman Park – Completed.
- e) Doeg Park Pavilion/Shade Structure – Bid in late winter to early spring. Construction spring/summer of 2022.
- f) Driving Range Repairs (Construction) – On Hold. Bids came in over budget, so we are reviewing scope of work and looking to make adjustments.
- g) Hazardous Tree Removal – Under Contract.
- h) Centennial Commons Painting.
- i) Centennial Commons Turf Replacement – Approved by City Council on 1/24/22. Install in Summer.

7) **Proposed Cell Tower** – Continue to work on the Contract Agreement.

8) **UCity In Bloom Irrigation Project** – Received a bid and I am waiting on Contract Documents and insurance.

**RECREATION OPERATIONS**

1) **Centennial Commons** – Continue to work towards expanding the hours of Centennial Commons. Staffing still remains to be the number one issue.

- c) Majerus Park – Trail Sealing – Bid in late winter to early spring. Construction spring/summer of 2022.
- d) Heman Park – Trail Sealing – Bid in late winter to early spring. Construction spring/summer of 2022.
- e) Lewis Park Playground Renew – Scheduling project with contractor.
- f) Metcalf Park Playground Renew – Received contractor quote. Scheduling project with contractor.
- g) Rabe Park Playground Renew – Received contractor quote. Scheduling project with contractor.
- h) Aerator/Seeder Replacement – Placed order with vendor.

## **GOLF OPERATIONS**

1) **Programs and Lessons** – Staff is currently working with contractor for Spring and Summer programs and lessons.

2) **Leagues** – Staff is currently working with outside groups and organizations on league dates and times for the spring/summer.

### **3) FY22 Equipment & Improvement Projects**

- a) Club House Outside Tuckpointing and Painting – Obtaining estimates.
- b) Security Camera Replacement – Project completed.

4) **Golf Course Management Plan** - Have developed a “Draft” of an overall Golf Course Management Plan.

5) **Hazardous Tree Removal** – Completed.

6) **Fees and Charges** – Staff continued to review existing pricing and the possibility of needing to adjust fees for spring 2022. This will be necessary to offset the increase in staffing costs.

7) **Golf Cart Maintenance** – Staff is working with contract vendor on the preventative maintenance of all golf carts in preparation for spring.

8) **Equipment Maintenance** – Staff in working on the preventative maintenance of all equipment in preparation for spring.

9) **Snow Removal** – Performed snow and ice removal during the recent winter storms.

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### BACKGROUND REVIEW:

In October of 2019, the City received a Municipal Parks Planning Grant for Greensfelder Park through the Municipal Park Grant Commission of St. Louis County. The purpose of the grant was to develop a Concept Plan that would be used as a guide for the future application of a Municipal Parks Construction Grant, as well as other grants for the redevelopment of Greensfelder Park.

As part of the requirements of the grant application, the City had to identify and receive an official quote from a prequalified consultant with the St. Louis County Municipal Parks Grant Commission. Accordingly, staff received a scope of work, cost estimate, and contract agreement from Gateway Design Studio, LLC.

From the onset staff had received input from surrounding residents that had stated that they would like to have a more passive park (nature themed, walking trails, playground, etc.) versus an active park (athletic fields, basketball courts, skate park, tennis courts, etc.). This was primarily due to the fact that the park is located deep within a neighborhood and that they would prefer not to have high traffic volumes, nighttime activities, athletic facility lights, etc., as those activities could take place at Fogerty Park which was more conducive and accessible and is less than a half mile from Greensfelder Park.

With that in mind, staff along with the consultant began the process of 1) An initial basic inventory/assessment analysis of the site and existing conditions; 2) Met and received input from City staff (Parks, Public Works, Planning and Police); 3) Developed Design Concept Drawings; 4) Held two Community Engagement Meetings (Although light turnout at both meetings, we mainly received positive comments from members of UCity in Bloom, Green Center, Urban Forestry Commission, Tree Tenders, as well as from residents; and 5) Presented and received comments from the Parks Commission, Green Practices Commission, Urban Forestry Commission, and members of the City's Green Team Committee and Great Rivers Greenway; and 6) From the comments received, staff and the consultant made minor adjustments to the plan.

The revised plans (Option A & B) consist of a nature themed park that includes stormwater retention/detention; multi-purpose trails; pavilion/restroom; native plantings (trees, plants, butterfly gardens); educational components (signage); a nature themed adventure playground; open lawn play area; future trail connections to GRG Centennial Greenway and Fogerty Park; and dedicated maintenance space for a possible tree/plant nursery, green houses, and a bulk storage etc.

**RECOMMENDATION:**

At the February 15, 2022, Parks Commission Meeting during the Park Priorities discussion, the Commission stated that they would like to have further discussion on the use and future development of Greensfelder Park and to place this item on the March agenda.

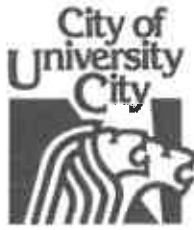
