At the Regular Session of the City Council of University City held on Monday, October 13, 2025, Mayor Terry Crow called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

Citizen Comments

Don Fitz, 6954 Dartmouth Avenue, U City, MO

Dr. Fitz stated as Chair of the University Heights' Flood Task Force, he wrote a recap of the October 7th Stormwater Commission (SWC) Meeting, which stated that the final wording of Susan Armstrong's Resolution on the plan to clear-cut-and-cement 11 acres of the current cemetery at Canton went something like this;

"The Stormwater Commission recommends to the City Council and Plan Commission against Rezoning and Conditional Use Permits for the Enclaves at Canton proposal due to potential adverse effects, and that the Applicant has not demonstrated adequate drainage." He then pointed out that the bolded word "and" is between the two reasons for rejecting the project. In order to gain approval, the Applicant would have to prove that there would be no adverse effects, as well as that there would be adequate drainage. Dr. Fitz stated that a developer might see this as a loophole for returning to the SWC only with a new drainage plan while ignoring negative aspects of the project. There are, in fact, many adverse effects of the proposal, which include ecological destruction of the 11 acres of mature trees, added flood water from clear-cutting trees, the Urban Heat Island effect of replacing cooling trees with heat-promoting concrete, and the connection between increased heat and increased violence.

Three days later, on October 13th, the *St. Louis Post-Dispatch* reported that Terry Crow told the reporter that he was concerned that the Commission said that it did not have all of the drainage data it needed. He said the City would request that information and another commission review before the Council would discuss it. In other words, Mayor Crow said exactly what he had predicted the developer would say; he responded to the drainage issue and ignored the much more important adverse effects of the proposal. Consequently, the question that needs to be asked is whether Terry Crow is taking his marching orders from the developers who hope to get richer from this environmentally devastating proposal? Dr. Fitz stated his hope is that Mayor Crow will give him an answer to the question: if, in considering the Canton Proposal, will he ask the SWC to consider all of the potential adverse effects or only those pertaining to drainage issues? Dr. Fitz stated that he would also like a response to that question from each member of Council and the City Manager. Thank you very much.

1. BILL 9576 - AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF UNIVERSITY CITY, MISSOURI TO ISSUE ITS TAXABLE INDUSTRIAL REVENUE BONDS (PARKVIEW PLACE PROJECT), SERIES 2025, IN A PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$60,000,000, FOR THE PURPOSE OF PROVIDING FUNDS TO PAY THE COSTS OF ACQUIRING,

CONSTRUCTING AND IMPROVING A FACILITY FOR AN INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT PROJECT IN THE CITY; APPROVING A PLAN FOR THE PROJECT; AND AUTHORIZING THE CITY TO ENTER INTO CERTAIN AGREEMENTS AND TAKE CERTAIN OTHER ACTIONS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH. Bill Number 9576 was read for the first time.

The presentation was very well received, and his hope is that it will inspire others to follow the path of the Task Force and conduct similar work.

Subj: "Clear-cut-and-cement" in Univ City - Is mayor in full support?

Flood Control Supporter,

In my Oct 10 "Recap on Oct 7 Stormwater Commission meeting" I wrote that the final wording of Susan Armstrong's resolution on the plan to "Clear-cut-and-cement" the 11 acres of the current cemetery at Canton was something like this: "The SWC recommends to the City Council and Plan Commission against Rezoning and Conditional Use Permits for the Enclaves at Canton proposal due to potential adverse impacts and that the applicant has not demonstrated adequate drainage data."

I pointed out that "The bolded word and is between the two reasons for rejecting the project – in order to gain approval, the applicant would have to BOTH prove no adverse aspects as well as proving adequate drainage.

"The developer might see this as a loophole for returning to the SWC **only** with a new drainage plan while ignoring negative aspects of the project. There are, in fact, many adverse effects of the proposal, which include ecological destruction of the 11 acres of mature trees, added flood water from clear-cutting the trees, the Urban Heat Island effect of replacing cooling trees with heat-promoting concrete, and the connection between increased heat and increased violence."

Only 3 days later (today, Oct 13), the St L Post-Dispatch reported that Terry "Crow, the mayor, told the reporter that he was concerned that the commission said it didn't have all of the drainage data it needed. He said the city could request that information and another commission review before the council would discuss it."

In other words mayor Terry Crow said exactly what I predicted the developer would say. He responded only to the drainage issue and ignored the much more important adverse effects of the proposal.

We must ask "Is Terry Crow taking his marching orders from the developers who hope to get richer from this environmentally devastating proposal?"

To the U City Council:

I hope that Terry Crow could give us an answer to the question if, in considering the Canton proposal, he will ask the SWC to consider all of its potential adverse effects or only those pertaining to drainage issues.

I also ask all members of the Council and the City Manager to let us know if they urge the SWC to consider all of the potential adverse effects of the Canton proposal or only those pertaining to drainage issues.

Dear Mr. Mayor and Members of the City Council,

My name is Hannah Briick and my husband Liam Briick and I both reside at 1079 Wilson Ave.

We are again grateful for the continued support and efforts by all members of the city council and those city staff members working on this project. We have no flooding to report since the last meeting and have been grateful for the space that has allowed us to continue managing other complex and emotional family affairs.

I have been in touch with Becky Ahlvin, Economic Development Manager & Interim Planning & Zoning Director. While citizens are not allowed to liaise with the hired project management group, Becky has agreed to provide us with regular updates about the progress of the project. We have been struck by Becky's kindness and how easy she has made it to establish a relationship with herself as our new contact in City Hall.

Unfortunately, to no fault of Becky herself, many homeowners involved in the buyout received a request last week to submit a number of documents which we previously submitted in February 2025. When we received the original request many months ago, Liam and I, and many of our neighbors, dropped everything to gather these documents for the city as quickly as possible. We provided original receipts and a notarized affidavit which we hand-delivered to city hall. I remember the hustle of that week, accomplishing all those tasks within business hours on top of our full-time jobs. I also remember the sense of relief we felt when we hand-delivered the documents and received confirmation that all the necessary paperwork had been received from us and all of our neighbors.

Dear U City Council Members,


Regarding the Canton Road/Hebrew Cemetery proposal, I propose that the well-being of U City, of the St. Louis region, and of our Earth is much better served by keeping this last patch of wooded living tissue of the Earth intact, than by scraping it away for more housing development.

The global ecological crisis is often conceptualized as something abstract, distant, driven by the forces of history. In fact, it is the cumulative effect of thousands of poor value judgments and moral errors, involving thousands of forests and other ecosystems trampled and discarded by their local landowners and governments for money, convenience, and the unhinged impulse for 'growth' as if it were a law of the universe. This is a habit that humans will quickly need to get beyond, if we wish our children any reasonable quality of life, rather than continuing the controlled demolition of Earth's capacity to support human life.

This little patch of woods in U City (see attached picture) is no different than those we cherish but are inside a protective invisible legal boundary by accident of history. A far better action would be for U City to approach UHC for acquiring either a conservation and public access easement or outright acquisition for a city park. With some honeysuckle hacking, a task at which there are many well-versed volunteers in the metro area, this could become a beautiful forest and refuge for residents. It would also, I would think, be more consonant with the themes of service, legacy, and care for Creation, befitting the adjacent cemetery and its owners.
